Water from his well in Wales was used to cure rabies in dogs.

To Honor St. Philomena



When Mother Mary Louisa of Jesus asked St. Philomena to teach her some devotion that would be acceptable to her, she heard an interior voice saying: “Recite the *Creed* three times: *once for the perseverance of the just, once for the conversion of sinners, and a third time for the return of heretics and infidels to the Faith.*”

Or Recite the *Gloria Patri* three times in thanksgiving to the Blessed Trinity for the graces given to her during the time of her martyrdom, by which the Lord made Himself her strong shield and caused her to be rapt in ecstasy for three hours so that she did not know what torments the tyrants sought to inflict upon her until the clamor of the people brought her back to her senses and she was forthwith beheaded.

Those who spread devotion to the saint have found this an excellent means to win her favor. This can easily be done by acquainting others with these devotions also by distributing leaflets and pictures.

Well, lady, I think that I can help you and save the day for you. Some time ago I clipped some lines about prayerful kitchen and housework from the London Catholic weekly “The Universe” and filed them away for future use. And now the chance to use them comes sooner than I had expected. Miss Cicely Halleck has composed a “Divine Office of the Kitchen,” published by Burns, Oates and Washbourne, London. The first stanza reads:

“Lord of the pots and pipkins, since  
I have not time to be  
A saint by doing lovely things and  
vigilling with Thee,  
By watching in the twilight dawn, and

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## ✠ AUTHORITY OF JESUS FOR US ALL

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### LOVING THE AUTHORITY OF JESUS

When I see a Christian grief-stricken at the trials God sends him I say to myself: Here is a man who is grieved at his own happiness. He is asking God to be delivered from something he ought to be thanking Him for. I am quite sure that nothing more advantageous could happen to him than what causes him so much grief. I have a hundred unanswerable reasons for saying so. But if I could read into the future and see the happy outcome of his present misfortune, how greatly strengthened I would be in my judgement! If we could discover the designs of Providence it is certain we would ardently long for the evils we are now so unwilling to suffer. We would rush forward to accept them with the utmost gratitude if we had a little faith and realized how much God loves us and has our interests at heart.

What profit can come to me from this illness which ties me down and obliges me to give up all the good I was doing, you may ask. What advantage can I expect from this ruin of my life which leaves me desperate and hopeless? It is true that sudden great misfortune at the moment it comes may appear to overwhelm you and not allow you the opportunity there and then of profiting by it. But wait a while and you will see that by it God is preparing you to receive the greatest marks of His favor. But for this accident you would not have perhaps become less good than you are, but you would not have become holy. Isn't it true that since you have been trying to lead a good Christian life there has been something you have been unwilling to surrender to God? Some worldly ambition, some pride in your attainments, some indulgence of the body, some blameworthy habit, some company that is the occasion of sin for you? It was only this final step that prevented you from attaining the perfect freedom of the love of God. It wasn't really very much, but you

could not bring yourself to make this last sacrifice. It wasn't very much, but there is nothing harder for a Christian than to break the last tie that binds him to the world or to his own self. He knows he ought to do it, and until he does it there is something wrong with his life... The misfortune which has befallen you will soon do what all your exercises of piety would never have been able to do.

Vatican II's soul is *ecumenism*, which is to abandon the dogma that the Roman Catholic Church is the one true Church, outside of which there is no salvation. But ecumenism is the child of relativism in regard to truth. Relativism holds that there are no absolute truths. Truth is what is true for you; something else may be true for another. This absurd form of thinking is traceable to modern philosophy in general, but in particular to Immanuel Kant, the Catholic Church's archenemy in the world of ideas. What St. Thomas Aquinas is for the Catholic Church, Kant is for the modern, liberal, and socialist world.

Needless to say, the application of Kant's relativism to Catholic dogma has a devastating effect. It rots dogma out. No adherence to supernatural truths remains. At best there remains only a corpse of dogmatic formulas.

The Catholic priest is defined by his adherence to unchanging, supernatural, and absolute truths.

When the acid of relativism is poured out upon these truths, they become corroded beyond recognition. The result is that the priest no longer has knowledge of and adherence to the very truths that define his priesthood. So the stage is set for the deviation of the priest in all sorts of ways. If he is inclined to the abuse of minors, there is virtually nothing stopping him from this path of destruction. Indeed, the priest who has fallen from the Catholic faith is in worse condition than anyone, for he is now desperate to find the worldly joy which he gave up. He had offered his celibacy to God for love of Him, in order to be detached from worldly things so that he could love God more. But once these spiritual realities disappear from his soul because of the destruction of dogma by relativism, the fallen priest finds a strong inclination to find worldly joy and pleasure where and when he can, since his spiritual joy is now impossible.

In other words, when a priest falls from faith, he falls into the deepest pit of sin, loses his moral conscience, and is capable of the gravest sins.

The solution to Vatican II is the destruction of Vatican II. Ecumenism must be destroyed. It is the destroyer of Catholicism in human souls.
