

New at St. Gertrude's? Welcome! In the vestibule you'll find a pamphlet explaining the traditional rules for the reception of Holy Communion. There is also a Visitor's Card to fill out if you want more information on St. Gertrude's or on the traditional Catholic Faith and the Latin Mass. A free information packet is available to newcomers; ask an Usher or inquire in the **Gift Shop**. Stop by **Helfta Hall**, our social hall, after Mass for refreshments.

Dress Code: *Ladies & Girls*—Please wear a modest dress and a head-covering. No tight fitting, low-cut, short, slit, or sleeveless dresses. No pants or shorts. *Men & Boys*—Please wear a shirt and tie, with either suit coat, jacket or sweater, and dress shoes. No T-shirts, sweat shirts, sweat pants, tennis shoes, sneakers, shorts, jeans or sports logo jackets.

Registration: Please complete a card at the Gift Shop or phone the church. Collection envelopes will be mailed.

Mass Intentions: Individual Mass intentions as well as Purgatorial Society enrollments are available in the vestibule, and may be given in with the collection or at the church office.

Votive Candles: You may light candles before the numerous shrines located throughout the main church as well as in the baptistery. The suggested donation for a seven-day votive candle is \$5.00. The suggested donation for six-hour votives is 50 cents.

Confessions: Fridays at 10:55 AM, Friday evenings and Saturday mornings (*please consult THE CALENDAR inside for times*); most Sundays before the morning Masses.

Baptisms: Saturday morning by appointment. *At least one parent as well as the sponsor (only one sponsor is required) must be practicing Roman Catholics who do not belong to the Novus Ordo religion. Novus Ordo and non-practicing Catholics may not serve as sponsors. The Church will provide a sponsor in case of necessity.* The Churching of New Mothers follows the baptismal ceremony.

Blessing of Religious Articles: First Sunday of the month after all Masses.

Blessing of Expectant Mothers: Third Sunday of the month after all Masses.

We celebrate this great feast with **All Day Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament** beginning with Exposition after the **8:00 AM Low Mass. Solemn High Mass** is sung at **11:20 AM**. The fathers traditionally recite the entire Divine Office of this day before the Blessed Sacrament Exposed, concluding with **Vespers** at **2:30 PM** followed by **Benediction** which closes the day.

Adorers are needed all day, especially from 1:00 to 3:15 PM. Come to pray before Our Lord for all of your needs.

✠ FIRST SATURDAY OF JUNE

This year, a "detached" First Saturday

opens the month of the Sacred Heart and continues Corpus Christi. The schedule is as follows:

7:15 AM Confessions

7:30 AM Low Mass, Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament

8:10 AM First Saturday Devotions, Sermon

8:45 AM (approx.) Low Mass and Benediction.

SOLEMNITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI

Our Second Collection for the seminary will be taken up as usual. The annual outdoor **Procession of the Blessed Sacrament** follows the 9:00 AM High Mass. If you are attending the 11:30 AM Mass, come early (approximately 10:45 AM) for outdoor Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, and to accompany Our Lord in the Procession. **First Holy Communion** takes place at the High Mass.

Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament is at 6:45 AM and adoration continues all morning. Plan to make a visit. Rosary Confraternity members are kindly asked to walk in the Procession. Exposition and Vespers are at 4:45 PM, followed by the final Benediction of the day.

Low Masses: Sunday within the Octave of Corpus Christi, with commemoration of the Octave and St. Marcellinus & Companions, Preface of the Nativity.

The “Easter Part” of the Mass

(Conclusion - continued from May 5, 2013 bulletin)

The Post-Communion

The priest returns to the side of the altar and there reads the Post-Communion (a prayer corresponding to the Collect). The Post-Communion symbolizes *the forty days that Jesus remained upon earth after His resurrection.*

During these forty days our Saviour taught the Apostles and continued His office of Divine Mediator by interceding for us in prayer to His heavenly Father.

The hands of the priest are raised toward heaven during the Post-Communion to represent this mystery of mercy and intercession. The position of the hands, in the form of a cross, reminds us also that it is the crucified Jesus who intercedes for us.

The Last Dominus Vobiscum

After the Post-Communion, the priest goes to the middle of the altar. He turns once more to the people and says, for the last time, “*Dominus vobiscum*” (The Lord be with you). Here we think of *our Lord going to the Mount of Olives, and of His last discourse to His Apostles before His ascension.*

Jesus walks with His Apostles for the last time here on earth. He wishes them peace. He gives them a last farewell instruction. And, like a father who is about to depart from his children, never more to return, He leaves them also His last will and testament: “*Going, therefore, teach ye all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you.*” (Trinity Sunday)

The Apostles are sorrowful. But Jesus consoles them in this supreme hour of their separation by reminding them that He will be with them always, and by giving them, and their successors, His divine guarantees of infallibility – His last words here upon earth:

“And behold, I am with you all days, even to the consummation of the world.”



The Feast of Corpus Christi

On Thursday, the Church will celebrate the feast of Corpus Christi, that is to say, the feast of the Blessed Sacrament of the Eucharist.

Holy Thursday is the day on which Our Lord Jesus Christ instituted the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist,



and gave to His Apostles His Body for food, and His Blood for drink, under the forms of bread and wine; and communicated to them the power of changing, as He Himself did, the bread and wine into His Body and Blood, saying to them: “Do this in remembrance of Me.”

Nevertheless, as that day is the eve of the Passion and death of Jesus Christ, and as the Church, filled with the grief which those sorrowful mysteries excite, could not celebrate the institution of the Eucharist with the joy which it should produce, she has set apart another day to solemnize the memory thereof with greater pomp, and has consecrated an entire octave to commemorate it in a particular manner.

The Church celebrates this feast as the triumph of Christ over impiety and heresy. She considers the presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament as the abridgment of His wonders, the masterpiece of His power, and the consummation of all His mysteries. It is the sacrifice and the victim of the New Alliance, and the reality prefigured by the shadows of the Old Testament. It is the prodigy of the goodness of God, the sign of His love for mankind, and the symbol of the union and charity which ever should exist amongst all those who have the happiness to partake thereof.



The Five First Saturdays

The devotion of First Saturdays, as requested by Our Lady of Fatima, carries with it the assurance of salvation. However to derive profit from such a great promise of Our Lady, the devotion must be properly understood and duly performed. The idea of the Five First Saturdays is obviously to make us persevere in the devotional acts for these Saturdays and overcome initial difficulties. Once this is done, Our Lady knows that the person would become devoted to Her Immaculate Heart and persist in practicing such devotion on all First Saturdays, working thereby for personal self-reform and for the salvation of others.

One means of obtaining the reign of Jesus Christ in souls and society, and of promoting peace, is to practice the Fatima message. The stakes are so great that to encourage Catholics to practice the devotion of the First Saturday, Our Lady has assured us that she will obtain salvation for all those who observe the First Saturdays for five consecutive months in accordance with her conditions.

At the supreme moment of death, the departing person will be either in the state of grace or not. In either case Our Lady will be by his side. If in the state of grace, she will console and help him to resist whatever temptations the devil might put before him in his last attempt to take the person with him to hell. If not in the state of grace, Our Lady will help the person to repent in a manner agreeable to God and so benefit by the fruits of redemption and be saved.





✠ THE BISHOP'S CORNER ✠

Eastertide has come to an end, and with it today the time for fulfilling the Easter Duty. The school year will soon come to an end. Summer has been ushered in with our Pentecost Ember Days. Its great feast days begin with Thursday's weeklong celebration of Corpus Christi. Next Sunday's solemnity will bring to an end the "c" sacraments for our little ones, with their First Holy Communion, prepared for by the Holy Ghost Himself in First Confession, and last weekend's grand celebration of Pentecost, the descent of the Holy Ghost, the Sacrament of Confirmation.



Fitting then, isn't it, that this season of beginnings and endings should begin with the feast day of the adorable Trinity, God in Three Divine Persons, who has no beginning and no end. This catechism or theological feast is also a devotional one, reminding us to practice our faith in prayer, honoring the three Divine Persons dwelling in us by Grace, not only this Sunday, but every Sunday – God Himself, in whose image and likeness we are made, and with whom we are meant to live forever.

The French call Corpus Christi the La Fête Dieu, the Feast of God, for Thursday's feast worships God with us "all days" sacramentally, in the Holy Eucharist. God Himself! Come and worship our Sacramental God with us as we adore the Blessed Sacrament Exposed all day on Thursday, and part of each day during the Octave. A Solemn Mass and a little Procession, the chanting of the Divine Office also mark this feast of feasts for us. So that all may participate, next Sunday's Solemnity again offers the adoration, High Mass and Procession as the First Communicants receive the Bread of Life for the first time.

The Pentecost Vigil this year shone out with fiery glory, everything from flowers to music to a generous and beautifully themed reception afterwards. Deo Gratias!

The weather has been oppressive for as long as we can remember, it seems. Still, all is green, and that is good. We are grateful for the sun and bits of blue sky from time to time, (I am writing this on Thursday's beautiful May morning) and hope our trees and bushes are getting a good drink. We lost a number of trees with last Summer's drought.

All eyes were on Cincinnati last week, with the IRS scandal. The problem is really one of bloated big government. Congress is as much to blame as anyone else in the debacle. "Your" representatives passed, but never properly publicized, a new law governing nonprofit corporations. As a result, thousands lost their tax exempt status, and had to scramble to regain it. More paperwork, worry, and headaches.

The tax collectors downtown were understandably overwhelmed by the applications and reapplications. Add to that the ever-present "duh" factor of human error, and the Obamization of all government, and you have the current crisis. Congress is largely the culprit. Beware of facile media explanations, which pander to ignorance and only confuse. The choking government bureaucracy continues to choke all Americans, regardless of which party predominates. It's no party anymore.

May the Holy Ghost daily enlighten us. Let us show our piety (the spirit of true patriotism) tomorrow by praying for the Poor Souls on Memorial Day. Pray for our soldiers slain in wars, the civilians, and indeed all of our beloved deceased. May they pray for us, and our country, in turn.

I am visiting St. Hugh today for Confirmations. Enjoy the holiday tomorrow. Keep Thursday as a kind of Holy Day with us. The prayer here at St. Gertrude never ends. Get in on it this week.

May the adorable Trinity dwell in you, heart and home.
