The stingy souls who contribute a very, very small proportion of their income to the support of the church, pity me because I have such a hard time raising funds. Those who contribute generously think I have a very nice job.

Some wonder what I do with all my time; others pity me because I have so much to do.

They want me to be more of a layman and to represent them in civic and public activities; but are forever praising Father "So and So," who is "so quiet and retiring." "He is such a holy man."

That a long, long time ago I got sick of applesauce and soft soap.

That I have grown immune to knocks and criticisms.

That I appreciate honest praise and want no man's pity.

That I am giving the best that is in me to my work and believe that God will reward me.

That I ask no favors and seek only the opportunity to prove that I am a real man and try to be a real priest.

Now, there are some who, if they knew who wrote this, would say: "I'll bet they got the idea from someone else." Well, I did!

- 6. When beholding His side pierced with a spear, and His body taken down from the cross.

#### 7. At His burial.

Make an act of contrition for your sins, which helped so much to cause the sufferings and death of Jesus, and resolve firmly that you will no more grieve the hearts of Jesus and Mary by sin. Ask her to assist you at your death by her powerful intercession, that then she may show herself to you as a mother, and obtain from her beloved Son grace for you.

Do you wish the world were better? Let me tell you what to do. Set a watch upon your actions, Keep them always straight and true. Rid your mind of selfish motives, Let your thought be clean and high. You can make a little Eden Of the sphere you occupy.
