

A CHILD IS BORN TO US THE WORD WAS MADE FLESH.

THE HOLY NAME OF JESUS

The Name of Jesus inspires such reverence and love that the Church has separated her commemoration of the giving of this Name from the feast of the Circumcision. Its celebration is of recent origin, but the veneration which inspires it is as old as the Church. Thus the apostle Peter bade the cripple at Lystra rise in the name of Jesus. By invoking this Name the Fathers of the desert put the devil to flight. The ancient masters of the spiritual life, in the cells of Sinai and Syria, regarded the invocation of the Name of Jesus as one of the most powerful aids to the attainment of perfection. Saints Bernard, Bernadine of Siena, and countless other western saints regarded it in the same light. This Holy Name is the last word that Christians try to utter on their deathbed, for there is no other Name by which we can be saved.

By invoking this Name, we honor the incarnate Son, on whom the Father Himself bestowed the Name of Jesus by His angel. We approach the Lord, who in this very Name (meaning Saviour), reveals to us the profoundest depth of His Sacred Being and of His Redemption. In reverencing this Name, we revere Jesus Himself, for in this one word He makes His presence felt among us, and the superabundance of His love. For this reason the apostle says that "everything in heaven and on earth and under the earth must bend the knee before the Name of Jesus" (Phil. 2:10)

O sweet Child of Bethlehem, grant that we may share with all our hearts in this profound mystery of Christmas.

Let us offer gifts, because utterly irreverent is the one who adores with empty hands. The Magi attest to this, who were weighed down with gold, aflame with frankincense, and hallowed with myrrh when they bent down before Christ's cradle.

THE HOLY NAME OF JESUS

For years the Franciscan Order has followed the lead of the apostles, urging reverence for the Holy Name

FRANCISCANS AND THE HOLY NAME

It was my privilege October 13, 1946 to walk with 25,000 in the Holy Name parade of the Queen City of the West. As we stepped along the streets of Cincinnati, Ohio, memory wafted back to the beginnings of such public demonstrations of devotion to the Divine Name. The early origins of ardent affection for the Holy Name were distinctively and peculiarly Franciscan.

Memory brought back the story of St. Francis whispering the sweet Name of Jesus with such delight that he would pass his tongue over his lips to taste its sweetness.

I saw the vast crowds gathered about "The Herald of the Holy Name," St. Bernadine of Siena, who never preached without a banner with the Sacred Name. I heard him calling upon the throngs who milled about him to respect and reverence that name above all names. I walked again in the Holy Name parades of five centuries ago with their beautiful banners and picturesque standards. In a profuse variety I saw medals and medallions with the letters IHS, the first three letters of the Greek word for Iesus, in the center of a sun disk, from the middle of which twelve rays streamed outward, symbolic of Him who said, "I am the Light of the world."

As thousands in 1946 thundered applause of the men marching, I recalled Blessed Thomas Illyricus, one time guardian of the Friars Minor at Toulouse, who so successfully stirred up devotion to the Holy Name that he obliged the cardmakers to turn their talents to the engraving of cards with the Sacred Name. In this new enterprise, they realized more profit than ever before. This same Blessed Thomas influenced the towns-people to inscribe Our Lord's Name "on all the gates of the city, and over the doors of numerous private houses."

This practice was promoted by

another brown-robe, Blessed Matthew, Bishop of Girgenti, who added the sweet name of Mary. To this very day one may still see those Names above many doors in Sicily. This custom was also preached by the patron of Franciscan parish missionaries, St. Leonard of Port Maurice, who carried with him on all his missions a banner with the Holy Name wrought in letters of gold.

A certain listener of Porto-Ferraio decided to decorate the outside of his apartment with the Sacred Name, but the Jew who owned the shop below opposed the plan so strenuously that the Christian contented himself with inscribing the Holy Name over his window only. A few days later a fire broke out in the shop of the Jew, destroying all its contents. The flames licked upwards only to stop miraculously as they reached the letters of the Adorable Name.

As I marched that October, I recalled that it was St. Bernadine who started writing an office of the Holy Name, which was completed by one of his faithful disciples, Blessed Bernadine de Busti. In 1530 the feast was established in the Order, and permission was granted by Pope Clement VII, at the request of a Friar Bonaventure, for the sons of St. Francis to keep the feast. This same Friar Bonaventure on his return from a pilgrimage to Rome established a chapel dedicated to the Holy Name, the first of its kind in France. In 1721 Pope Innocent XIII extended the feast to the universal Church and appointed the second Sunday after Epiphany as the day.

Our hearts hark back to this "Herald of the Holy Name" as we approach the New Year and the feast of the Holy Name. There are lessons and inspirations in the rise of this devotion. With Bernadine and Capistran and Leonard you will find obstacles and difficulties in showing your love for the person and Name of Jesus. Even misusing His Holy Name may be difficult to overcome.

To get into the practice of respecting and repeating that sweet Name with reverence will not be easy. But these saints in brown have set us an example. We see them saving burning buildings and winning decisive battles through the power of that Name. In the power of that same Holy Name we will go on to win the battles of the New Year.

When **St. Bernadine** was brought by his enemies before the Pope and accused of heresy in preaching the Holy Name of Jesus, another Franciscan, his friend, **St. John Capistran**, came to his aid and ably defended Bernadine and his preaching before the Papal Council, **June 8, 1487**. Overjoyed, the Pope ordered a procession, which was led by Capistran bearing his "IHS" banner, while the secular and religious clergy and all the Roman laity followed singing through the streets of Rome.
