THE HOLY FAMILY

Why does the devotion to the Holy Family receive decreased emphasis and attention during our so-called modern times? In this day and time when the evil of "divorce" is so widespread shouldn't this devotion be revived?

If this commendable devotion is not practiced as much as formerly, this regrettable fact can hardly be ascribed to the Church, for this feast continues to have a prominent place in the liturgy of the Church. Each year, the feast of the Holy Family is observed on the Sunday following the Epiphany, which is annually observed on January 6. Besides, both of the feasts, that of the Nativity of Our Lord and that of the Epiphany, present to all who are blessed with the gift of Faith the sacredness of the union of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph.

It's possible that those who can remember what was the practice of forty and fifty years ago will recall that in those days few Catholic homes were without an appropriate picture of the Holy Family. As a rule such a picture or statue group occupied a prominent place among the wedding gifts of a newly married couple. Perhaps, married couples then did not have the opportunity of visiting and inspecting "model houses," an opportunity that is quite highly advertised in our present times. However, it's quite likely that formerly husbands and wives united by the sacred bond of matrimony at God's holy altars frequently in spirit visited prayerfully the "model homes" in Bethlehem and Nazareth in which the Holy Family resided.

If I may be pardoned a personal reflection, I venture to state that I recall the last three words spoken by my own dying mother almost fifty years ago. She uttered them with a final breath, the sweet and meaningful words of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. Other children undoubtedly have similar sacred recollections!

Don't you think that much more should be done to make people understand and appreciate the sacredness and joyousness of genuine Christian married life? What would you recommend?

First of all, let it be remembered that much has been done to achieve this holy purpose. The Catholic Church all through history has preached that marriage is a Divine Institution, the oldest or most venerable institution on earth. Little children from their earliest ages are made familiar with the towns of Bethlehem and Nazareth, little towns that have become world famous just because they were sanctified in being the dwelling places of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. During the very Christmas season, there will be found in most Catholic churches devout replicas of the Home of the Holy Family in Bethlehem.

Thoughtful and successful parents receive inspiration from family prayer. Families that pray together stay together. The home becomes just a little less sacred than the Church itself. The Christmas season is truly a spiritual Spring time for sanctifying anew every Christian Home.

I have seen people suffer unduly because they had offended a person whose whole life seems to be bound up in paying off old scores. Can you offer some considerations that may enable me to overcome the spiritual depression that I am in on this account?— A Mother.

Certainly, any genuine Christian, particularly a Christian mother, shudders when the pagan monster, Revenge, threatens or ravages those who may be guilty of human errors. However, exceptional instances of such inhumanity serve to remind us of the general benefits of Christianity.

The message of Christianity is truly an appeal for pardon in human relations. St. Paul, in his letter to the Romans, emphasized the New Law. He pleaded with them, in fact, with all men: "To no man render evil for evil, but provide good things not only in the sight of God, but also in the sight of all men. If it be possible, as far as in you lies, be at peace with all men. Do not avenge yourselves, beloved, but give place to the wrath, for it is written, 'Vengeance is Mine; I will repay, says the Lord.' But if thy enemy is hungry, give him food; if he is thirsty, give him drink. For by so doing thou wilt heap coals of fire upon his head."

"An eye for an eye" and "A tooth for a tooth"— that despicable talion of the Old Law has been thoroughly rejected by Christ. Any revival of the Old Law by any modern avenger should challenge Christian witnesses to a better observance of the Christian principle: "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us!" Returning frequently in spirit to both Bethlehem and Calvary, one can learn to forgive even the avengers.
