My dear Friends,


The Lenten Lesson (III Kings; XVII) from the Mass of Tuesday of the second week of Lent is so striking, and seems so well accommodated to our situation as Catholics today, that I thought I would write to you about this tale of far-off Elias and his exile in Sarephta.

Elias, prophet of Mt. Carmel and the latter day, fore-shadows Christ and His Mystical Body, the Church. Israel rejects her Redeemer, and is punished by a drought. The Prophet departs from its midst, and brings God's grace to the gentiles. So today we see the Holy City deserted during this spiritual famine, and the Church in exile, and knowing hunger and want.

The widow of Sarephta is a figure of Holy Mother Church, poor and suffering, but still going, in her widows' weeds, to "gather two sticks." The saints say this wood represents the Holy Cross. With this heavenly wood, the widow mother bakes the Bread of the Angels to feed her children, by means of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, which gives us Holy Communion and God great glory. "En colligo duo ligna," "I'm just gathering two pieces of wood," says the Church still today in the face of famine, and in the midst of all the loss and confusion.

As then neither bread nor the bit of oil failed, so too, in today's spiritual famine, neither Mass and Holy Communion, nor the other sacraments will fail us, even though we must dwell in a foreign land and often know want, begging for mercy to which we have no strict right. Only let us imitate the widow woman's great charity and humble obedience, then will we see how God is never outdone in generosity. Honor the person of the priest. Pray for your priests and provide for them, as once this widow did for Elias of old, and was so abundantly blessed.

Let us imitate this charity during the last days of our Lent. At St. Gertrude the Great, although our needs are many, we are giving everything to the poor souls during this season of self denial.

During Paschaltide I hope to report to you on our Lent and Holy Week here, as well as on my Mexican missionary journey which your generosity made possible.


May the holy souls accompany us all during these holiest days of the year!
