H FAMILY PRAYER

The importance of family prayer was taught by Our Lord Himself. For He said: "Where two or three are gathered together in My Name, there am I in the midst of them." What a pleasing sight must it be to God, therefore, to see the family unit which He ordained gathered together to worship Him.

The presence of Jesus will surely be a source of blessing to the home where parents and children unite to offer up prayer in common. The spirit of piety which this custom develops will sanctify the bonds of family love and ward off the dangers which often bring sorrow and shame.

As we learned in childhood, we should pray at least upon arising in the morning and retiring at night, and before and after meals. It is much more beneficial to all members of the family, and especially more inspirational to the children, when everyone habitually says such prayers together. Because of different rising times, it may be difficult for all to pray at the same time in the morning. However, the saying of grace before and after meals should become a family habit. No food should be eaten until grace is said, and no one should leave the table until thanksgiving is offered after the meal, or the family Rosary.

Many families have developed the admirable habit of saying the Rosary immediately after dinner. Other families set aside a period just before the children's bedtime. Regardless of the hour chosen, the reciting of prayers at a specified time each evening establishes habits which will last throughout the years and will give a sense of kinship in God to all in the family.

An especially worth-while custom is the evening recitation of the Rosary. It was most earnestly

advocated by Pope Pius IX, who in his last days said: "Let the Rosary, this simple, beautiful method of prayer, enriched with many indulgences, be habitually recited of an evening in every household. These are my last words to you; the memorial I leave behind me." Every member of the family will have a greater feeling of participation in the Rosary if the leader is rotated each evening or for each decade. One time Father may lead; next, Mother; next, the oldest child; and so on until everyone has had his turn. Then the cycle is repeated. Before each decade, the father might briefly discuss the meaning of the specific mysteries in the lives of Jesus and Mary which the Rosary reminds us of. The children should be taught to meditate on these mysteries so that they do not say the prayers without thinking.

Tips for Praying the Family Rosary

Make it a rule that the child who prays all the responses and volunteers to lead a mystery (10 beads) gets to stay up 10 minutes more than everyone that night - at our house this means you get to watch baseball or have a book read to you. This may be the most important tip. Kids under 7 or 8 need this sort of incentive. If you tell a six year old to pray the Rosary so that you receive grace and sanctity - they don't get it. If you say, pray the Rosary so that you can stay up late and read a book with me - they'll hit their knees and pray like angels.

The one who gets to stay up also gets to blow out the candle at the end. This gives another incentive to pray the prayers - especially for the younger ones. For some reason, blowing out the candle is a really big deal to younger children. (Kids love fire!!!) You'd be amazed how a four year old will attempt to stay still if he can only place a grain of incense on a flame or blow out a candle. (Did I mention that kids love fire?)

End with invoking everyone's patron saint (your children's names, confirmation names, and other patrons), e.g., Saint Thomas: pray for us. Saint Jude: pray for us. Saint Anne: pray for us." Always finish with St. Joseph and then Holy Mary, Mother of God. Then say "Sacred Heart of Jesus: have mercy on us," three times.

After the daily Rosary is established in your home, have each child announce a mystery and pray the whole decade. This gives them confidence in praying and makes it natural. Plus, they'll learn to memorize all the mysteries of the Holy Rosary - which means they will have memorized the biblical account of Christ's life, death, and glory! This is why the Rosary is called the "Bible on beads."

¥ Sacred Heart of Jesus

The Sacred Heart and the Rosary

If you want to know the true devotion to the Sacred Heart, you must study the Passion. See the agony in the garden, the keen cutting pain at the kiss of Judas, the cold shiver at the denial of Peter, the dragging with cords, the blow on the Sacred Face, the spitting, the shame, the foul words, yet all this was nothing, it was little to the longing pain of God seeking man's love. The scourging, the crowning with thorns, the heavy cross placed on those poor, torn, bleeding shoulders, yet even this is little, and why? Because there is still a greater proof of love. "Greater love hath no man than this, that he lay down his life for his friend." Study the Crucifixion; see there what God rejoiced to suffer, if so He only might give us proofs which we might believe of this longing for our love. He chose gladly, nay even willingly, to suffer all this; it was even less pain to Him than the coldness of our hearts.

Meditate frequently and with devotion the Sorrowful Mysteries, and you will grow in understanding of the Sacred Heart, and His love for us.

"See how the army of your sins,
A cruel army, proud and fierce,
The Heart of Jesus, innocent,
Ungratefully and basely pierce!
"Your sins direct the cruel stroke
Made by the thrusting soldier's lance;
And the dread sharpness of its point
Your crimes with mortal guilt
enhance."

The Appeal of the Sacred Heart for Reparation. Picture a loving mother or father weeping and inconsolable for deep sorrow of heart. Then look at the many extraordinary manifestations of filial compassion from the side of dutiful sons and daughters; hear their repeated solemn protestations of sincerest love and loyalty, and notice their exceptionally tender caresses and generous offers of kind services, all to stop the flow of the scalding tears provoked by the hurt and

sorrow inflicted by some offensive word or rude and loveless behavior of a wayward brother or sister, or perhaps to make reparation for an offense all their own.

In this picture you have an indication, although only the faintest, of what we, if we would be true lovers of the wounded Heart of our Jesus, should be doing every day of our life; in view of the staggering reality of the Heart of Jesus wounded on Calvary, wounded in the Holy Eucharist through all the Christian centuries, and wounded anew, even frequently, it may be, by our own personal negligences, offenses, and sins.

O my soul, do come to realize how truly the majestic Christ of God is become your own personal Jesus. For during all His life on earth, and especially from the prayer of His agony in Gethsemani, even to His cry of victory: "It is consummated!" you yourself, with your whole life of sin, were present to Him. You were present even so that your own personal sins scourged Him and crowned and wounded and broke His Sacred Heart.

And your present daily sins, your negligence and cold indifference, are actually wounding the Heart of your Jesus present in the tabernacle. In the Blessed Sacrament His Sacred Heart cannot be physically pained nor made sorry or sad; but it can be criminally ignored, wronged, and dishonored: its rights can be made wantonly invaded and its titles to adoration, love, and imitation can be insultingly denied and ungratefully ignored. Indeed, by every least sin of yours, you are more or less guiltily dishonoring and offending your divine Saviour and wounding His Heart of love.

Hence, in the name of honor, and of justice, have you not a peculiarly sacred duty to make reparation every day to the Saviour Heart you yourself are offending and wounding, even so habitually?

Resolution: I will attend the sacred Heart Novena on Friday evenings, with Mass and Communion, as often as possible.

¥ ST MARGARET MARY

Sometimes we're called upon to do **special things.** That's what happened to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque. In 1675, Jesus told her He wanted her to let as many people as possible know about **the love that flows from His Sacred Heart.** Few people believed her. Some thought she was crazy! But St. Margaret Mary did not lose faith; she continued her devotion.

As a Visitandine sister, she was in charge of helping form the new sisters. She shared with them what she had been told by Jesus in prayer, and they, too, became devoted to His Sacred Heart. That devotion included the Feast of the Sacred Heart, which is always the Friday after the the Feast of Corpus Christi. It also included receiving Jesus in Communion on the First Friday of every month, and praying every Thursday evening to commemorate Jesus' Agony in the Garden.

Like St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, you can be an "Apostle of Prayer," devoted to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. To do so, offer everything - your prayers, works, joys and sufferings - in union with Jesus and other apostles of prayer throughout the world every day.

Remember, Christian soul, that thou hast this day, and every day of thy life-

God to glorify, Jesus to imitate, The Angels and Saints to invoke, A soul to save, A body to mortify, Sins to expiate, Virtues to acquire, Hell to avoid. Heaven to gain, Eternity to prepare for, Time to profit by, Neighbors to edify, The world to despise, Devils to combat, Passions to subdue, Death perhaps to suffer, And judgement to undergo.
