#### **★** THE BISHOP'S CORNER ★

Not just the first days of March, but all the last of Winter have been a roaring lion, stealthily stalking us again and again, its unexpected snowstorms devouring two weeks of our Lent, and the last three Sundays. Oh, Lenten life here has gone on very well, and thank God that most of you have been able to make it. But sixty or so of you were stranded, and thus missed Mass. We missed you. If you *missed* the Mass, and longed to be doing your Lent at Calvary's altar, it is good, and these will not be lost days for you, and your Lent. Now, on to spiritual Spring this time change Sunday... Time for a change in our souls, isn't it?

We missed you, but we hope you will not miss your weekly contribution. We will certainly need all of you to make up for any missed envelopes, and even some Lenten sacrifices to make the king's ransom the Duke will be sending round to collect. For the rest, do make it to something extra this week, Stations or Mass, just to show you're still in the land of the living, and onboard for Lent.

Saturday I'll be giving a Lenten Retreat. No charge, just a few hours of your time to pray and reflect and recharge your batteries in the quiet of church. We'll spend the day with St. Francis, starting with Mass at 8:10, and ending about 2 PM after the traditional Stations and Benediction.

Prayerful silence is always welcome, of course, but Internet problems do complicate life. Last week along with the arrival of the new organ, we lost some Internet, and much time working around it, and trying to diagnose and repair it. But it returned mysteriously on Thursday morning, it seems. **Fr. Cekada** thinks it may have been the raccoons, (who are back again, too) chewing in just the right place.

**Fr. Nkamuke's** email was hacked by a fairly clever hacker last week when he was in Ghana. But of course Nigeria is the nirvana of email fraud, so this is to be expected. Father reports that all is well now. He is spending the rest of Lent in Oweri and Porthartcourt before returning to the capital city for Holy Week.

Fr. McKenna left the frozen Midwest for frozen Boston last week for his grandmother's funeral. With the help of the CMRI Sisters he sang the Requiem Mass for her on Friday, and then returned to Milwaukee. Fr. Lehtoranta is getting in on Heaven after all, as he has taken up feeding the hungry, and very well indeed. We ran out of Lenten food last week, and Father has proven a most talented and creative vegan cook. He fed us "hamburgers" one night, and pasta and "meatballs" another, and all without the meat! Fr. Cekada was delighted by the vegan mayonnaise, and we were all charmed by many such small touches that make for a great meal. I am grateful for the relief, as I used to be terribly distracted during Vespers by the thought of what to feed the Fathers. Now I can concentrate on the pslams, hymns, and antiphons, with the

altar boys, who are continuing to pick it up. One of the crew, Peter McClorey, turned 13 last week, as did one of our homeschooler servers a while ago, Patrick Omlor. Time to be thinking about recruiting fresh torchbearers. Altar boys, remember your special day on Saturday March 21.



When we eat dinner together at the Convento, we now sing the long Latin grace before and after, as they used to do at the seminary. Puccini often assists at the meals, and shocks me with his naughty behavior. He's good as gold when he visits the "bishop's palace" for the breakfast buffet and the odd sleepover. Well, the other night he made a terrible ruckus during grace, as though he were objecting to it. I've never seen him behave this way, howling like an alley cat, jumping on my chair. Fr. Cekada says it was our singing! Cats have sensitive ears, and I'm sure our chanting does leave something to be desired....

Fr. Cekada is in seventh heaven with our new old organ, a model from 1996, but one whose technology is



considerably advanced over the previous one, given by a devout lady from Kentucky, the late Dorothy Spicer, a great admirer of Archbishop Lefebvre. This time many of you, and our Internet friends con-

tributed to cover the comparatively modest costs. The difference in tone and sound is remarkable, although the fearsome array of speakers on the back wall *is* rather intimidating. We're all looking forward to Easter.

But first, welcome to Lent for those who missed it. Thursday is already Mid-Lent. Let's make each one of these blessed days count, as we count down to the glorious days of Holy Week and Tenebrae and Easter with its vigil. May your soul know Spring.

#### How to Resist

We ought to protect ourselves from temptation by assiduous work, by keeping our thoughts fixed upon God, and by continual self-conquest.

In order to hold a fortress against the enemy two things are necessary: (1) Strong fortifications and wellguarded gates; (2) In case of attack, valiant defense. In like manner we must protect our soul, to prevent the entrance of the evil enemy. Our fortifications will be: Continual occupation; this is the surest means of holding temptations aloof. Thieves do not break into a house where work is going on. Idleness is the parent of crime. We shall also find it easy to resist temptation, if we keep our mind fixed on God. A traveler journeying towards a fixed destination meets with few difficulties on his way, whereas the vagrant, wandering hither and thither, is sure to get in trouble. So it is with the Christian who makes God his final end, and one who has no aim in life. Hence Christ exhorts us: "Watch ye and pray, that you enter not into temptation" (Matt. xxxvi. 41). Wolves do not approach a watch fire and the devil leaves those alone who are on their guard. When Moses stood with arms uplifted to God, Israel was victorious; but when through weariness he let them fall, that moment the enemy prevailed. The majority of the sins good people commit come from forgetfulness of God's presence; the habit of self-control also greatly helps us to conquer temptation. He who is accustomed to repress his impulses is like a soldier, well trained in the use of arms before he goes into battle. Practice in self-conquest strengthens the will. But attachments to creatures makes a man an easy prey for the devil; just as one who carries a heavy load cannot run away when robbers attack him.

So long as a man is trying, though he may fail, he is worth help and tolerance, for such a man is doing his best.

Be less critical of and more charitable to those who are fighting to conquer themselves. Many men emerge victorious after a prolonged struggle.

#### **★** THE CATECHISM CORNER



Inasmuch as the faithful servant of Christ, St. Francis, was in certain things well-nigh another Christ, given to the world for the salvation of mankind, God the Father willed to make him in many actions conformed and like unto His Son Jesus Christ; as is made manifest in the venerable College of the Twelve Companions, and in the admirable mys-

tery of the sacred stigmata, and in the unbroken fast of the holy Lent which he made on this wise. On a time, St. Francis being, on the day of Carnival, hard by the lake of Perugia, in the house of one of his disciples, with whom he had lodged during the night, he was inspired by God to go and keep that Lent in an island of the lake; wherefore St. Francis besought this disciple of his that, for the love of Christ, he would carry him in his skiff to an island of the lake, whereon no man dwelt, and that he would do this on the night of Ash Wednesday to the end that none might know thereof; and he, for the love of the great devotion which he bore St. Francis, diligently fulfilled his request and carried him to the said island; and St. Francis took with him nothing save two small loaves. And, when he had landed upon the island, and his friend was about to depart and to return to his house, St. Francis besought him lovingly that he would not reveal to any man that he was there, and that he would not come for him until Holy Thursday; and so he departed. And St. Francis remained alone, and, in that there was no dwelling there, wherein he might find shelter, he entered into a very dense thicket, which many brambles and bushes had made like unto a cave or little but; and in this place he set himself in prayer to contemplate celestial things. And there he abode all Lent without eating and without drinking anything save only half of one of those little loaves, according to that which his disciples found on Holy Thursday when he returned to him; for he found of the two little loaves one whole and half of the other. It is believed that St. Francis ate for reverence of the fast of Christ the blessed, who fasted forty days and forty nights without taking any earthly food; and on this wise, with that half loaf, he cast forth from himself the poison of vainglory, and after the example of Christ fasted forty days and forty nights. Thereafter, in that place where St. Francis had shown such marvelous abstinence, God did many miracles through his merits; for which cause men began to build houses there and to dwell there; and, in a little while, a walled village, fair and great, was made there, and withal the Place of the friars, which is called the Place of the Island, and the men and women of that village still have kept great reverence and devotion for that place where St. Francis kept the said Lent. (Chapter VII from "The Little Flowers of St. Francis")

(Continued from last week) The fourth thing necessary for salvation, is the practice of Good Works.

The good works which we are obliged to perform are contained in the Gospel, in the Commandments of God, and those of the Church.

The two principal things which the Gospel commands are, to avoid evil, and to do good.

The principal good works which we have to perform, consist in the practice of spiritual and corporal works of mercy, which we ought to exercise towards our brethren, assisting them in their necessities, and forgiving their trespasses against us.

The Gospel commands us also to mortify ourselves, to practice humility, to despise the world, to do penance, to endure all sorts of evils with patience, to keep ourselves pure, to watch and pray.

The evil which we should especially avoid is sin. We should fly from it, and hold it in horror, as the greatest of all evils.

Sin is a thought, word, or action against, or an omission of, any one of the commandments of God or of the Church.

There are seven capital sins: Pride, Covetousness, Lust, Envy, Gluttony, Anger and Sloth.

The Sacraments are sensible signs, instituted by Our Lord Jesus Christ for the sanctification of our souls.

## Modesty & Fashions Think you know it already? You may still need a refresher!

At Fatima, Portugal in 1917, the Blessed Virgin Mary condemned in advance the pagan fashions of our day, warning us: "Certain fashions will be introduced that will offend our Lord very much." At a later date, Our Blessed Mother made known what standards of modesty in dress she requires of women and girls, through the Holy Father, Pope

Pius XI, her Divine Son's Vicar, who set this norm:

"A dress cannot be called decent which is cut deeper than two fingers' breadth under the pit of the throat, which does not cover the arms at least to the elbows; and scarcely reaches a bit beyond the knees. Furthermore, dresses of transparent materials are improper..." By Donato, Cardinal Sbaretti, Pref. of Congregation of the Council; Feast of the Holy Family, Jan. 12, 1930.

Until this mandate from the Holy See, as to what constitutes modesty in dress, is revised, modified or rescinded by the Holy See itself, **these minimum standards are binding on everyone**, regardless of any opinions to the contrary held by so many people these days—even within the Church.

**N.B. Q:** What about "modest" pants? No mention is made in the above.

**A:** Pants on women weren't a fashion until after WWII, after the above mandate was made. Certainly given the above standards, pants on women would have been a fashion **not approved** for Christian women.
