FROM BISHOP DOLAN

My dear Friends,

I am writing this April report to your on Easter Friday, when our Lord tells the Apostles in the Gospel "Going therefore teach ye all nations..." Surely these words are addressed to all of us as well. As we turn words into deeds, we turn to you as well for your support for what is becoming more and more a worldwide apostolate. God is blessing our humble efforts, and surely will reward your assistance which makes our apostolate possible.

At the end of February I visited Father Roberto Mardones who has chapels in Ciudad Juarez, Mexico and El Paso, Texas. Father Mardones had only visited us the month before for a Solemn High Mass on Epiphany to celebrate his Silver Ordination Anniversary. Father is a longtime and loyal friend to us, as well as a true pastor to his people in what has been in recent years one of the most difficult, even dangerous, parts of Mexico. His chapel there is a beauty to behold with its many altars, statues and careful organization. On Sunday afternoon we crossed back into Texas and I offered Mass in a small charming chapel, full of character and devotion, like the people who attend it. Father Mardones' flock has always been relatively modest in size, but under his priestly guidance serves as an example of Catholic perseverance in a pagan world.

In early March our "northern" missioner, Boston-born Father McKenna, offered Mass for a small group of faithful in Quito, Ecuador, and was privileged to be admitted into the Conceptionists' cloister to visit the famed image of Our Lady of Good Success, a great grace which is granted to very few.

Curiously enough, no one has ever started a chapel or mission in Quito, which has developed into a kind of spiritual headquarters for the R&R groups. But Our Lady seems to be favoring our work, and a number of priests have expressed their willingness to visit there with a true, good Mass, one not offered in union with the Argentine apostate who occupies Rome.

Meanwhile, without ever leaving West Chester, Father Cekada has dedicated himself to producing informative and entertaining videos on the questions of the day. His presentation on Archbishop Lefebvre, Sedevacantist, has already been seen by thousands. We hope to present a French version, as well.

Truly, "their voice is gone forth to all the world," whether in writing, online, in videos, by the Mass webcast, or...the old way, in person. But what would be the benefit of speaking to men if we did not address ourselves first and best to Almighty

Please pray for our priests, our faithful and benefactors, and join us in the profession and support of the unchanged faith of our fathers.
