#### ¶ CORPUS CHRISTI SUNDAY

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of Corpus Christi. First Holy Communions take place during the High Mass, with the annual outdoor Procession of the Blessed Sacrament following. The second collection today is for the support of our seminary. The Blessing of Religious Articles will be available after the procession.

Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament continues all morning. Plan to make a visit! Exposition and Vespers are at 4:45 PM, followed by the final Benediction of the day. Sunday classes are finished for the season.

#### ¶ THIS WEEK...

...continues the Octave of Corpus Christi. The great privilege of Mass before the Blessed Sacrament Exposed and Benediction is ours each day: 11:25 AM Monday through Thursday. Friday is the Sacred Heart (8 & 11:25 AM, 5:45 PM). Come and renew your family consecration by a devout Communion. This "week of weeks" concludes with the feast of the Queenship of Mary.



¶ NEXT SUNDAY: SACRED HEART Next Sunday is the Sunday Within the Octave of the Sacred Heart. Vespers with Sacred Heart Devotions will be at 4:45 PM, followed by Benediction.



☐ Set Your Missal: Sunday within the Octave of the Sacred Heart, with commemorations of Pentecost III and St. Margaret. Proper Last Gospel of Pentecost III. Preface of the Sacred Heart.


★ THE SUNDAY GOSPEL
★ THE POETRY CORNER

The Church would seem to have been divinely inspired in choosing for the Gospel of this Sunday the parable of the "Great Supper;" and that, many centuries before the establishment of the festival of Corpus Christi. For, although its primary signification is generally interpreted as the banquet of eternal joys in heaven, many of the Fathers see in it a secondary reference to the Church's supreme banquet of the Holy Eucharist. It is spread for all; its guests need not the recommendation of noble birth or prominent social rank to make them welcome, but merely the loving invitation of the Divine Master of the house to partake of the Heavenly Bread prepared for the children of men. So desirous is He of feeding His faithful children with this Bread that He is not satisfied with inviting them to the Banquet, but will even "compel them to come in." "Unless you eat the flesh if the Son of Man and drink His blood, you shall not have life in you," says Our Lord; and His Church is but echoing His words when she commands her children, under the pain of sin, to approach the Divine Banquet at least once in each year.



HOLY COMMUNION: OUR PROTECTOR

The eminent means of protection from our spiritual enemies supplied by our loving Father is surely that Bread from Heaven "containing in itself all sweetness;" that "Bread of the strong," which fills us with such power that, as St. Chrysostom says, we leave the Holy Table "like lions breathing fire,"—an object of terror to the demons. In that Holy Eucharist Our Lord is truly a "support," a "refuge," a "deliverer."

This has been quite a week. Trinity Sunday's solemn splendor was followed by Memorial Day's sorrows and joys and parties. Congratulations to all. Corpus Christi's Eucharistic adoration, the Divine Office and Solemn Mass, allowed us to observe together as priests and faithful the Sacrament which we rightly name "Blessed." We are now in the blessed days of the Monstrance and Benediction. Others came for First Friday or during the night. We usually get just enough.

Today's grand celebration before the Blessed Sacrament Exposed has its highpoint in First Holy Communion. Jesus abides with us "all days" chiefly so that He may go to the Father in Sacrifice and to the children as Nourishment. But, wonder of wonders, He abides with us day and night in the tabernacle. No wonder we break forth from the church today in solemn procession to express our joy, and give jubilant thanks.

Weather permitting, of course. Rain comes most days anymore. Good for the roses, anyway. But the weeds... Thanks, *many* thanks to our volunteer gardeners who came, are coming, and may yet come to keep beautiful the grounds of your church, with its many shrines. Take a stroll.

Ever since April, the hot afternoons overwhelm our air conditioning easily, despite three new units installed the last year or two. It's a fiery furnace by Vesper time. What went wrong? Mystery. The man was on the roof checking the other day. But it looks as if it will be another long, hot summer in the Lord's service.

Thanks are in order this First Communion Day to our Sisters and their catechism teachers for another successful year. We must say the same for the ladies and men (thank you for your persistence, **Fr. Cekada**) of the choir. What beautiful music is offered up each Sunday for God's Glory and our great edification.

The good men of the Schola were out in force and sounding strong last Sunday for High Mass and Vespers. The Schola sings through Summer, and we are grateful. I am grateful to the 9 o'clock faithful who traditionally sing the High Mass during the Summer months. This enables us to continue to solemnize, as we should, the chief Mass of the week, and you and your children to learn and sing the Church's own music, Gregorian Chant, as well as so many of our beloved hymns. Who sings, prays twice.

Our webcast school High Masses conclude this week with the great feast of the Sacred Heart. But first the full Octave of Corpus Christi continues with daily

Mass before the Blessed Sacrament Exposed, and Benediction. We exhaust ourselves in adoration these days, like melted wax or burnt out coal. We ask only for a handful to help,



but it sure would be fine to have a churchfull during these special holy weeks we call octaves.

Parents, don't forget the fine tradition of bringing your First Communion children back one day this week to make their Second Communion. What touching thanks this would be. You could even dress them in their white again, one last time.

I wish to thank as well our teachers for another fine school year at St. Gertrude the Great. We don't pay our teachers much, can't afford to. They're almost volunteer! But what a service they render. God reward them. He will.

Fr. Cekada travels tomorrow to the seminary for his last teaching week. Volunteer, of course. But pretty good teaching. Vocations are our most precious commodity, and anything you do to foster them is rewarded, sometimes even before our eyes. We hope to have new **Fr. Dutertre** here for a "First Mass" this summer.

The **McFathers** are off to the missions for Corpus Christi Sunday. First Communions for Milwaukee today as well, and a procession. **Fr. Lehtoranta**, whose knees seem to be holding out, is offering most of the Exposition Masses this Octave, as he finishes up his teaching year.

There, that's a bit of a news roundup. Come round some time this week and help us pray. OK?

#### THANKS TO OUR MUSICIANS

This Sunday is the final one of our 2017–2018 choir season and is a good occasion to thank our church musicians for all their efforts to render glory to God in worship at St. Gertrude the Great.

We are grateful to our Gregorian men's schola, which sings the chants of the Propers each Sunday, and to our Friday night choir, both under the direction of Mr. Charles Simpson. Under his direction, the schola has developed so well that it is now able to sing even the more difficult chants of the Gregorian repertory with ease.

We are likewise grateful to our children's weekday chant choir, and to our Sunday adult choir, both under the direction of Mrs. Joan Lotarski.

Our Sunday adult choir, as we never tire of pointing out, is a group of quick learners, and this has been the case once again over the past nine months. We had two new altos and four new baritones join us last September. This made it necessary to teach them motets and Masses that were already in our repertory, and the results were amazing. They learned:

- Sixty-two motets out of 100 in the repertory.
- Sixteen Latin hymns out of 29 in the repertory.
- Nine Mass Ordinaries out of 19 in the repertory.
- Nine Creed settings out of 11 in the repertory.
- Five Asperges/Vidi Aquam settings out of 8 in the repertory.

We were also very pleased to premiere two works composed by our organist, Andrew Richesson, the *Mass of St. Gregory the Great*, and the motet *Verbum Caro Factum Est*. Both are impressive compositions that reflect not only the highest musical standards, but also the best traditions of truly Catholic sacred

music. We congratulate Andrew on his compositional skills, and our choir on its dedication to learning these challenging works so well.

May God bless our musicians for adding so much each week to His glory!
