¶ THREE DAYS IN AUGUST

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of this week are sacred to the Virgin Mary assumed into Heaven, and to St. Anthony, so devoted to Our Lady under this title. Portugal gave the Church not only St. Anthony, you know, but also Fatima, Ground Zero for Heaven's Peace Plan. See how much you can do this week, to work for peace, by prayer and processions, novena and rosary, and most of all Holy Mass.

Monday's Mass is at 5:45 PM for the feast of Our Lady, Refuge of Sinners. Meet us in West Chester at 7:15 for the August Fatima Rosary Procession. Tuesday of course is one of St. Anthony's Thirteen, with Novena after Mass: 8 & 11:25 AM and 5 PM. Wednesday is the Holy Day, of course, which concludes this Triduum with three Masses: 7:00 & 9 AM, and 5:45 PM. Whoever you are, whatever burdens you, don't worry. Pray!

¶ THE ASSUMPTION

On Wednesday we keep the Summer Holy Day of Obligation, Our Lady's Assumption. The 7:00 AM Mass is the Workers' Mass, with no sermon.

The main Mass of the day is the 9:00 AM Pontifical. We join the servers, clergy, and choir in processing to the Grotto for the



traditional blessing of the First Fruits. Bring some produce, herbs, and flowers from your garden. Bring your children, who represent the angels who filled the sepulchre of Our Lady with beautiful flowers. This procession leads us back into church for the High Mass.

In the afternoon, we sing Vespers at 4:30, and then expose the Blessed Sacrament for Rosary. Benediction is at 5:30, with Mass at 5:45 PM.

The Blessing of Expectant Mothers will be available at the Communion rail. Vespers with Benediction will be at 4:45 PM.

HERALDS PREPARE THE WAY

Jesus Christ was announced by the prophets and prefigured by numerous types in the Old Law to prepare the people for His coming. Now that He abides with us under the appearances of the Eucharist, it is the same. At every Holy Mass He sends His precursor before Him to prepare the way. The great line of patriarchs and prophets has been increased by the apostles and evangelists. All these great men of God were heralds of the Almighty. They spoke of a God, a Man, a Redeemer, a King of heaven and earth, a Lawgiver, a Judge and a Recompenser. They made known His commands, His promises, His threats. They also portrayed His life and death.

EPISTLE

In the first ages of Christianity, passages from the prophets were read before the holy Gospel; later, also passages from the letters of the Apostles. In the Roman liturgy, the Epistle varies. It is taken from the Old or from the New Testament, and the lessons are more frequently taken from the letters of the Apostles than from the prophets. Therefore, we call the Lesson "Epistle," which means "letter." Formerly the Epistle was read by the lector from a special elevated place, a kind of pulpit; since the eight century, the Epistle is read by the subdeacon at Solemn High Mass, and at the ordinary celebration of Mass, the priest himself reads it. Formerly, the celebrating bishop or priest decided what was to be read each time. The present order of the Epistles and Gospels was arranged by St. Jerome (died 420) and finally

established by Pope St. Pius V, in 1570.

The priest lays his hand upon the book or altar while reading the Epistle, to show us that we should be ready at once to put our hand to the work in order to conform our life to the principles laid down for us in the Epistle.

At the conclusion of the Epistle, the server answers, in the name of the people, "Deo gratias!—Thanks be to God!" in order to express their gratitude for the Divine revelation, which God does not grant to everyone. Willingness to fulfill God's precepts, and gratitude for His sacred Word are the sentiments which should animate the Christian during the Epistle and the Gradual which immediately follows it.

EPISTLE PRAYER

O eternal God, Who never ceasest to excite us to the worship and love of Thy holy Name, or to arm us against the attacks of the world, the flesh, and the devil, by the public ministry of Thy Church, by the doctrine of Thy Prophets and Apostles, and by many other holy admonitions, grant that we may faithfully attend to these lessons of salvation, that thus our knowledge of Thy Law may never rise in judgment against us, but guide us securely to Thee, through Christ our Lord. Amen.



BISHOP SANBORN ANSWERS BISHOP FELLAY

The third heresy of Vatican II: The new ecclesiology. By *ecclesiology* we mean the Church's doctrine concerning its own nature, that is, its essence and characteristics. Vatican II teaches a *heretical* ecclesiology. It is contained in *Lumen Gentium*.

The traditional dogma of the Catholic Church is that the Catholic Church, and it alone, is the one true Church of Christ, and that therefore any entity outside of itself is a false religion. This includes even those schismatic religions of the East which may have a valid priesthood and valid sacraments. If you are cut off from the center—the pope—you are nothing but a dead branch that has fallen off the vine.

Vatican II altered this doctrine in order to include other Christian denominations in the Church of Christ, saying that the Church of Christ, as an organized body, *subsists in* the Catholic Church.

...If the Church of Christ does not subsist on its own, but must subsist in something else, it means that the Church of Christ is really distinct, by nature two different things. It means that the Church of Christ *is not* the Catholic Church, and the Catholic Church *is not* the Church of Christ. If they were by nature not two different things, then they would be the same thing, and it would be necessary to say that the Church of Christ *is* the Catholic Church, which is precisely the dogma of the Catholic Church.

The "subsists in" doctrine also means that the Church of Christ could subsist in something else, like the Lutheran Church, for example.

While this doctrine does wonders for the heresy of ecumenism and religious liberty, it destroys the Church's teaching that the Catholic Church is exclusively the Church of Christ, and vice versa. The Church of Christ and the Catholic Church are one and the same, and exclusively so, meaning that no other "Christian" organization can call itself the Church of Christ in any way whatsoever. The only appropriate name for them is a heretical or schismatic sect.



What is it that keeps us perpetually straining and moiling and wearing ourselves away, but some desire which is not chastened, some thought of the heart which is not dead to this worldly state? What makes us lament the flight of time and the changes of the world, but that we are still a part of it, and share its life? What makes us die so hard, but that we leave behind us more treasures than we have laid up in heaven—that our hearts are not there but here?

THE TWO BOXES

There are two St. Anthony Boxes in the vestibule for your use. Both are for giving something to St. Anthony. Both have a statue of St. Anthony. The little box on the table receives your petitions, which go into the golden chest at his feet in the sanctuary. Give him your prayers with loving confidence.

The other box is a "bread box," a slot in the wall next to the Gift Shop to receive your offerings in honor of St. Anthony for our poor. We have some, indeed, and they do count on us. We count on St. Anthony to help them, sometimes literally to feed them. This is called "St Anthony's Bread," and it functions all year round.

The idea is to give so that you may get—your prayers answered. This arrangement started in Toulouse, France in 1890, and soon became a popular way of petitioning the Saint of Padua.

Glorious Saint of Padua, dear Anthony, Like thy Master thou hast compassion with the multitudes;

Thou art the defender of the laden and oppressed;
Thou givest aid to the poor and suffering;
Thou hast resisted the cruel and the usurers,
And continues to act as provider of the hungry—
O good Saint Anthony,
Inflame my heart with thy practical charity.
May I always see in the poor, the Lord Himself.
May my hand be always open to relieve the needy,
Help me to become a consoler of the oppressed.

Let me do good to all for the sake of Christ. Then I can await the hour of judgment with confidence.

Because the reward of heaven shall be mine.
