REJOICE AND LEAP FOR JOY


By surrender to God I mean giving oneself up to God, to be transformed in Him. It is the cure for self that is the core of the whole thing; we require to be cured of *self* by being changed, as the bread and wine on the altar are changed, into Christ.

In this surrender is, I believe, the cure for the torment of self, which is precisely what most psychological suffering is. It is the cure for the weakness that cannot carry the common burden of the world's sin; the cure for the fear that causes the will to wither before the challenge of life, the cure for the feebleness that makes the impact of natural beauty painful, the cure for the cowardice that causes the heart to contract and shrink before the challenge of love.

When a saint surrenders himself wholly in this way, it is true that he will certainly accept whatever circumstances God allows for him. He may sometimes, because of his individual and unique vocation, go out to meet and welcome some of them. Such things as poverty, pain, bereavement, persecution—what you will—but he will not accept them or welcome them because he supposes them to be the essential things in his life, but because, compared to the joy, the power and the beauty of God, they will be almost nothing at all. They will be to him like leaves blown in the wind, the great wind of the Spirit of Love that sweeps the world like blown fire, setting it alight with His glory. For the saint the surrender to God is a tremendous fling of the heart, comparable to a leap into the fire of eternal Love, to burn with its heat, to take the radiance of its light, to dance in the dancing of its flames.

For us it is a more secret thing, but none the less miraculous for that. It means that we begin to be able to enjoy life, and gradually gain in strength of spirit until we can enjoy everything.

THE FLOWERS ON THE ALTAR

All this was once shown in a vision to Nicholas de la Flue, a holy hermit of Switzerland who was greatly enlightened by God in spiritual matters. While this good man was one day present at Mass, he saw a large tree full of the most beautiful flowers. He soon noticed that the flowers began to fall down upon those who were present. But some of the flowers, as soon as they fell, became withered and dry, while others retained their freshness and fragrance.

After Mass, he related this vision to his brother and requested him to explain its meaning. The brother replied that he too had seen the vision, and he explained it as follows: "The tree," said he, "is the Holy Mass; the withering of many of the flowers signifies that many of the graces which Our Lord distributes in the Mass are lost because Christians are not recollected and devout while they assist at this sacrifice, or because afterward allow worldly thoughts to stifle all the good inspirations which they have received; the flowers which retained their odor and beauty signify the permanent fruits which those Christians derive from the Mass who assist at it with reverence and devotion and who, after having left the church, are still mindful of the great blessings which they have received from this holy sacrifice."

It is such a strength to know that weak as we are, we have two strong, loving mothers: Holy Mother Church, and our Blessed Mother. And, of course, we rejoice today at the prospect of Easter. Not so much the *end* of Lent, as its fruition: Resurrection. Christ rises from the dead, and I in Him.





Finally, she is Apostolic: Credo Ecclesiam Apostolicam. Yes, her existence dates from the commencement, that is to say, she comes from Our Lord Himself; she did not spring up all on a sudden when five, ten, or fifteen centuries had gone by, as was the case with Protestantism, for example; had she come thus tardily into being, she could not have come from Our Lord. In order for her to be the true Church, she must be Apostolic, that is, she must have a hierarchy, which dates back even to the Apostles, and, by the Apostles, to Our Lord Himself.

Thus, we believe the Church; and God wishes us to believe her to be One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic: *Et Unam, Sanctam, Catholicam, et Apostolicam Ecclesiam.* We believe her, because she is founded upon these four essential Marks, which are the very meaning of her being called a Church of divine Institution, and she is proved to be that, by the very fact of her having those four Marks.

MONDAY IN LENT IV

The priest makes the Sign of the Cross over the Chalice and Host.

Jesus is nailed to the cross. Lord Jesus Christ! Who wast nailed to the cross for my redemption, attaching to it through Thy sacred Flesh, my sins and the eternal punishment due to them, grant me Thy saving fear, that resolutely observing Thy holy precepts, I may be ever attached to the cross with Thee.

Prayer during the Canon.

O Jesus, dying on the cross for love of poor sinners, through *Thy sacred head* crowned with thorns I beg Thee to have mercy on all bishops; on all priests; and on all our superiors.

Through the wound in *Thy right hand* I recommend to Thee my father, mother, brothers, sisters, relatives, friends, and benefactors.

And through the wound in *Thy left hand* my enemies, all poor sinners, and those who have never been baptized. Help Thy servants who are trying to convert them.

Through the wound in *Thy right foot* I pray for the poor, the sick, and the dying, and for all who are in any kind of pain, temptation, or trouble.

Through the wound in *Thy left foot* I beg of Thee mercifully to grant eternal rest to the souls of the faithful departed, especially N. N.

Through *Thy Sacred Heart*, O Jesus, I offer myself to do and suffer all things for Thy love. Give me all the graces I stand in need of, and especially the grace which I am seeking to obtain through this holy Mass.

Resolve. To obey perfectly even in difficult matters. **Pray**. O Jesus, to Thee I live; O Jesus, to Thee I die; O Jesus, Thine am I in life and death!

TUESDAY IN LENT IV

At the Consecration.

Jesus is Crucified. The Victim is laid on the altar; the sacrifice begins. Blood flows in great streams from the four extremities of His body now pierced with huge nails. O Cross! Thou Cross that art bathed in Divine Blood, how shouldst thou not be unto me a

tree of life? But, my Jesus, life and the source of life, are they not to be found on the altar where Thy priest has just uttered the words of consecration—words which change the bread and wine into Thy most Precious Body and Blood?

WEDNESDAY IN LENT IV

At the Elevation of the Host.

Meditate on Christ nailed to the cross by His hands and feet, set forth as a spectacle to the whole world. – *Luke xxiii. 33*. Behold, O man, thy Redeemer! With what affection has thou hitherto embraced Him, Who here, with extended arms, invites thee to His embrace? "My Beloved to me, and I to Him." – *Cant. ii. 16*.

The cross of Jesus is elevated between heaven and earth. Lord Jesus Christ! Who wast pleased to be elevated on the cross and exalted above the earth for the love of me, detach my heart, I beseech Thee, from all terrestrial affections and ele-

vate my understanding to the consideration of heavenly things. "Tell Him that I languish with love." – *Ibid. v. 8.*

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"Who then shall separate us from the love of Christ? shall tribulation? or distress, or famine? ...For I am sure that neither death, nor life, ...nor any other creature shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus Our Lord." – *Rom. viii.* 35-39.

Resolve. Strive to practice poverty perfectly. **Pray.** O my only Good, I willingly embrace holy poverty, since for my sake, Thou didst become the poorest of all.

THURSDAY IN LENT IV At the Elevation of the Host.

Jesus raised on the Cross. Eternal Father, behold the Victim of our salvation Who, once sacrificed to Thy justice on the altar of the cross, now speaks to Thee and implores Thy mercy on our behalf. The wounds of my Savior's body and the many drops of His Precious Blood are so many eloquent voices, pleading to Thee in favor of guilty man, and saying: "Have mercy, O God, spare Thy people whom I have redeemed with My Precious Blood." My Lord and my God!

At the Elevation. Contemplate Jesus hanging on the cross, and adore the same Jesus here present on the altar; say with utmost reverence and devotion: "My Lord and my God!"

Jesus, my crucified Savior, Thou didst die for the love of me, let me die to self and to the world for love of Thee!

FRIDAY IN LENT IV THE MOST PRECIOUS BLOOD

At the Elevation of the Chalice.

Reflect how profusely Christ poured forth His blood from His five sacred wounds for the washing away of our sins. Run to Him, O sinner, that thou mayest be cleansed, and "draw waters with joy out of the

Savior's fountains." – *Is. xii. 3.*

"Suffer me, therefore, that I may lament my sorrow a little, before I go, and return no more, to a land that is dark and covered with the mist of death." $-Job \ x. \ 20$, 21

The Elevation of the Chalice.

The Blood of Jesus flows from His wounds. Lord Jesus Christ! Thy sacred wounds are the inexhaustible source of all grace; grant then, that Thy precious Blood may purify my soul from all evil thoughts, and prove a salutary remedy for all my spiritual miseries. "Perhaps darkness shall cover me." – Ps. cxxxviii. 11.

Resolve. Strive to practice true self-denial, and accept all things with a holy indifference from the hands of God.

Pray. Holy Mother, impress thy sufferings deeply in our hearts.

And by Thy most bitter death give me a lively faith, a firm hope, and a perfect charity, so that I may love Thee with all my heart, and all my soul, and all my strength; make me firm and steadfast in good works, and grant me perseverance in Thy service, so

that I may be able to please Thee always. Amen.

IN UNION WITH OUR LORD'S PASSION

OPENING PRAYER



What, in fact, can be more suitable than to think of what passes before our eyes? Now, at the altar, everything speaks to us of the passion and the death of the Savior: the cross surmounts the tabernacle and is seen upon all the sacred vestments; the stole rep-

resents the chains by which Jesus was attached to the pillar; the girdle, the scourges which lacerated His flesh; the maniple, the cords with which He was bound; the passing to and fro of the priest from one side to another of the altar recalls to mind the different tribunals at which He was made to appear. The Mass itself is a lively and real reproduction of the sacrifice of Calvary; it is the same Victim and the same Priest. It is true that in it Jesus Christ borrows the person of a man to render His invisible priesthood visible; but in reality it is always Jesus Christ Who consecrates, Jesus Christ Who immolates Himself, Jesus Christ Who prays. Ought not all this show us that during holy Mass we ought to meditate upon His passion and death, inspired by the same pious sentiments with which we should have been animated had we assisted, together with Mary and St. John, at His agony upon Calvary; that, consequently, we ought to sacrifice ourselves, body and soul, to the great living God, in order to form, with Jesus Christ, but one sole victim?
