DOING THE WILL OF GOD

Of all the signs of a person's knowledge and wisdom, none is proof of greater wisdom than that one does not cling to his own opinion: Lean not upon your own prudence (Prov 3:5). For those who cling to their own judgment so as to mistrust others and trust in themselves alone, invariably prove themselves fools and are judged as such: You see those who are wise in their own eyes? There is more hope for fools than for them (Prov 26:12). But if a person distrusts his own judgment, that is a proof of his humility, which is why it is said, Where humility is, there also is wisdom (Prov 11:2), whereas the proud are too self-confident.

Accordingly, we learn from the Holy Spirit (by His gift of knowledge) to do not our own but God's will, and by virtue of this gift we pray to God that His will may be done on earth as it is in heaven. It is in this that the gift of knowledge is proved, so that when we say to God, Thy will be done, it is as when a sick man consults a physician. He takes the medicine not precisely because he wills it himself, but because it is the will of the physician. If he took what he willed himself, he would be a fool.

Hence we should ask nothing of God but that His will be done in our regard—in other words, that His will be fulfilled in us. For one's heart is right when it agrees with the Divine Will. Christ did this: I came down from heaven to do not My own will, but the will of Him that send Me (Jn 6:38).... For that reason He taught us to ask and pray, Thy will be done.

How is your Lent going so far? Fast tempo, I'll bet. The Russian Orthodox convert, Catherine de Hueck, wrote in last Sunday's meditation that Lent *slowly* unfolds its music. But all of a sudden, we're at



the final verse. One of the Fathers noted that Thursday would be only a month until Palm Sunday! But make each day count in some way, and you'll be ready for the Holy Week countdown to Easter.

I thought the first Ember Day of Spring, Wednesday, would cinch the end of Winter, but it came back a bit Friday, like the Tempter who never easily gives up. But Christ in us wins the victory (St. Felicity says), as inevitably as the warm sunny weather will return.

It's time again for the very best gift you can give your children: one weekday at church to pray and be instructed and to be fed by Our Lord Himself, maybe to help them save their soul. Please let us know they'll be coming, and pray that not a one misses. "If you knew the Gift of God..." Pray too for our young families to be regular in their duties of Sunday Mass and catechism for the children.

Sunday's short Stations started well, with a good crowd. We had a wonderful first Friday Evening of Recollection, with the Way of the Cross and more. The Lenten dinner was so good there were no leftovers. Clean plate club!

Fr. Cekada's march towards recovery from stroke is a bit like the weather these days, firmly, surprisingly even, he is moving forward to Spring. How happy we were to see him at the High Mass last Sunday. How happy he was to make it. The therapists, and my own eyes, report good progress. God hears our prayers. So pray.

THE ADORABLE FACE OF JESUS

Our Blessed Lord Himself is the Teacher of Devotion to His Adorable Face. He is the world's first photographer. ORGAN DONATION

On the question of organ donations, we are only allowed to donate eyes, or one of our two kidneys. Why? Because these may be removed without causing death. The other organs are useless if removed from a dead body. Therefore the 'donor' is kept alive until the organ is removed. But this causes the death of the donor. It is vivisection, the cutting up of a living person so as to remove an essential organ, which induces death.

The theory of 'brain death' was made up in recent years, contrary both to science and theology, in order to justify vivisection, which has become a big business. Essentially someone is killed in order to transplant an organ. But is he not going to die anyway? Perhaps, but we may not do evil so that good may come of it. Have nothing to do with this big business.

Man is not the master of life and death, God is. Death is not the supreme evil, sin is.

THE SEVEN PETITIONS OF LIFE (CONTINUED)

The phrase "Hallowed be Thy name" acknowledges the true shape of things and recognizes the grandeur of God in Himself, apart from His creation. We give Him glory, not because He needs this tribute from our littleness, but because we need to acknowledge Him for our own perfection, and because man, as lord of creation, may fittingly speak for all the things that God has made.

In "Thy Kingdom come," the mind turns from eternity to time, to a prayer for grace enough to make our every act a service of this King. For "the Kingdom of God is not a matter of eating or drinking this or that; it means rightness of heart, finding our peace and our joy in the Holy Spirit."

"Thy will be done on earth, as it is in Heaven" is a plea that lesser wills shall be ignored, so that God's peace may prevail in us. There are many wills we can obey: our selfish will, which destroys our neighbor's rights and our own peace of soul; the dictator's will, which crushes individuality; the will of public opinion, which sends us through life with no more stability than a cork on the ocean; or, finally, the will of God, which ushers in the perfection of peace. MONDAY IN LENT II

"Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven." After having asked God our Father to give us the Kingdom of Heaven, the ever-

lasting Kingdom which is meant for our inheritance, we beg Him to give us grace that we may submit our will to His during the wearisome delay in obtaining the Kingdom which we are waiting to possess. The heir to a throne exiled from his country and immured in a dungeon is impatient to be set free, that he may mount the throne which is set up for him in his palace; he greatly needs patience and resignation to brook the slightest delay. Such is our own case. We some day are to be happy in our Kingdom. The happiness is deferred, and much do we need patience and conformity to the will of God: "Thy will be done."

TUESDAY IN LENT II

We ask moreover that God's will may be done, in order that by doing it we may merit this kingdom. God does many things by



His supreme will; but He wishes many other things that depend on our free will and which He commands us to do; He wishes us to accomplish many things which He counsels us to do for our perfection. To God's absolute will should we submit with resignation; we must do with loyal compliance what He commands; devote ourselves heartily to what He counsels and fulfill in all respects His holy will: "Thy will be done."

Act of Spiritual Communion

Thy will be done: And what else is Thy will but our sanctification, especially now that we are about to draw near to this most holy Sacrament?

WEDNESDAY IN LENT II



God Almighty teaches us by a beautiful illustration how we ought to fulfill His holy will:

"on earth as it is in heaven"—as the angels and saints do His will in heaven; they carry it out in all particulars lovingly and without self-seeking of any kind. Let us accomplish this holy will as they do in heaven, earnestly and lovingly and without reference to our own interests: "Thy will be done."

Act of Spiritual Communion

Thou dost will that we should eat the Flesh of the Son of Man and drink His Blood, seeing that we cannot otherwise have life in us. But who that knows his own weakness and sickness could presume to do this, had Thou not with Thy Son so lovingly and so condescendingly willed and commanded it?

THURSDAY IN LENT II

"Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven." Surely this will be one of the extraordinary joys of heaven, that there all will be perfectly attuned to the most perfect and all-



holy will which is rightness and goodness itself, the infinite perfection of rightly ordered love. What an Eden earth would still be if men even remotely approximated this ideal; if they could at least be brought to believe that God's will is best on earth as well as in heaven. We may scarcely hope that the golden age will dawn on earth when here, too, all will do God's will as it is done in heaven. But it would be a new and a very wonderful earth v indeed, if only men in general strove to make God's will, His Law of Love replace the reign of greed, God's Law of Purity replace the reign of lust, God's Law of Truth replace the reign of the father of lies. What a world it would be, indeed! Sorrow there would be, and sickness and death; it would still be an exile, but even the exile would be a wonderful foretaste of Home.

FRIDAY IN LENT II THE HOLY SHROUD


But God will not—in this world!—enforce His will violently. At times a soul-stirring visitation, to remind men



anew, lest they forget or think God has forgotten, that God is still "the Lord." But always will He jealously respect the liberty He bestowed when He made man in His own image. God's weapons will ever be Truth and Love—Truth that once became Man and dwelt among us, so that all who would could know; Love that still continuously pours Itself out into the sanctuary of men's souls, if only they be of good will. For the Spirit who is Truth and Love will be with us all days. Ah, if only the all-good will of God could "conquer the whole world and all enemies," and reign! Strange, that to do so, He has chosen to depend so largely on our will and

desire, that "Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven."

SATURDAY IN LENT II



In those words, "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven," we ask God to help us and to help all men to do the will of God in all things, just as it is done in heaven. Only God has the

supreme right to be obeyed in all things. What the Almighty wants is our first and final law.

God has an absolute right to rule over us because He created us, He redeemed us, He provides for us. By the will of God, we mean whatever pleases Him, whatever He wishes and desires, whatever He has determined, planned and declared. When we pray, "Thy will be done," we ask God first to make His plan known to us, and then to give us the grace and strength to carry it out.

God's will is not to be confused with that of an earthly dictator, nor of an unfeeling and unmerciful overlord. Rather, as a loving Father He wills what is best for us. Many have the mistaken idea that God wants to hinder our happiness. Someone has said in this vein: "Everything pleasant in life is either fattening or forbidden." On the contrary, God demands and God forbids because things must harmonize with His holiness, which again is for our own good.

A lady who had an only child told her neighbor: "I don't dare pray, 'Thy will be done,' because I am afraid God will take away my little boy, or will send me some

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misfortune." To this the neighbor replied: "Suppose your child would come to you and say, 'Mother, I want to do just what you wish today.' Would you say to yourself, or to anyone else, 'Now is my chance to make him do all the disagreeable and difficult things I want done. Now is my chance to take advantage of his willingness to please me, by cutting down on his pleasures and keeping him at hard work?""

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"No, no," exclaimed the mother, "I would rather give him the best day I could possibly plan. I would allow him more liberties and pleasures than usual, just because he was so willing."

"Well," said the neighbor, "do you think God is less just and less loving than you are?"

The Ten Commandments tell us what God wants and what God

does not want. They form the ten-point plan of the All-knowing God. They are the blueprint for a better life and a better world. Forget that plan, lose sight of it, neglect it, or spurn it, and the individual suffers, society suffers. History teaches us that lesson, a lesson some people refuse to learn. As Christ told the rich young man: "If thou wilt enter into life, keep the commandments." (Matt. 19:17)

As you pray those words, "Thy will be done," ask God to help you know His law and keep His law. Ask that every human being know His law and that every man, woman, and child keep His commandments, by the help of His grace.

THY WILL BE DONE ON EARTH AS IT IS IN HEAVEN

How to Meditate:

Say a little prayer to the Holy Ghost to start. Read over the text slowly. Pause, reread it prayerfully. Sit quietly with it. Pray in your own words. Conclude with the Our Father.

Act of Spiritual Communion

For the Will of Thy Son is one with Thy Will, and His power one with Thine. Wherefore since Thou dost will it thus, be that done which Thou will, and as Thou will. And truly Thou dost will us to be holy, seeing that Thy Son, to whom we are about to draw near, is holy, yea, the Holy of holies. But who can make us holy, save Thou alone? Give us, then, what Thou dost command; grant that we may not handle holy things but holily, and with religious awe; wherefore, as in heaven Thy saints feed to the full on this living Bread in its very reality, with pure hearts and glowing desire, so may we on earth eat it, wrapped and veiled beneath the sacramental species, with great desire and pure affection, until, together with Thine elect, we feast on it, in its true form and very substance, and are satisfied with the fullness of Thine house.
