

FR. MIGUEL PRO

In 1926 Mexico was passing through a period of violent anti-Catholic repression. As a Jesuit novice, Fr. Miguel Pro had fled the country in 1914. Now he returned in disguise; to be identified as a priest would mean instant arrest. His mission was simple: to serve the Catholic people, strengthen their faith, celebrate the Sacraments, and elude arrest as long as possible.

Making his way to the capital, Fr. Pro managed to evade several close calls. He spent his days hearing confessions, performing clandestine baptisms, and saying Mass. There were spies everywhere but also, it seemed, an inexhaustible supply of loyal Catholics prepared to undergo terrible risks to assist a priest on the run.

Eventually he was captured and charged with participation in a plot against the government. President Calles personally ordered his execution. On the morning of November 23, 1927, he was taken to the police firing range, where a crowd of reporters had been summoned. After praying, Pro stood and held out his arms in the form of a cross. As the firing squad took aim, he called out, "Viva Cristo Rey!"—Long live Christ the King!

The president had surely not reckoned on the power of martyrdom. Photographs of Fr. Pro's execution became holy cards, eagerly distributed among the faithful.

"We ought to speak, shout out against injustices, with confidence and without fear. We proclaim the principles of the Church, the reign of love, without forgetting that it is also a reign of justice." – Fr. Miguel Pro

Yesterday we concluded our 54-Day Rosary Novena, on the feast of Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal. Thank you for your devotion and persevering prayer. May our Advent be one of sober "rejoicing in hope" and calm prayer as we prepare for the coming of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ.

As the clouds of impending doom continue to gather, our Catholic homes must be inviolable sanctuaries where the Faith is loved and practiced. What a help is the Church year, with its charming customs which never grow old, and give the very best atmosphere in which children should grow up. Remember the Advent Wreath, the straw placed by the little ones in the crib for each prayer or sacrifice, and always a blessed candle for the family Rosary.

The Fall leaves and harvest themes give way to evergreens, the feasting to at least a little bit of fasting, from groaning plenty to purple and penance. Fix your Advent program now, what you will give up, and what you will do extra, like a little Lent. You won't regret it. Jesus is always on His way to us, either as the sweet little Child, the Savior on His clouds of glory, or Jesus Hostia in every Holy Mass. "Behold, He comes."

Make the most of First Friday and Saturday this week. Watch and pray with us during the quiet sacred hours of the night. It is our chance to catch up with Christ before the world does with all of its demands this December.

THE CRY OF ADVENT

Holy Church cries out to Jesus, desiring that we join her in repeating the word proper to Advent—the plea of the exile—

"Come!" In heaven our song will express possession, felicity; from our lips and from our heart will break forth the "new canticle" of holy Scripture. But in our banishment, although once in a while that heavenly chant flashes like lightning at midnight, ordinarily we can intone only the word of hope and desire: "Come! Come!"

This is the word of exile. Let us not tire of repeating it. If we lie in darkness and in the shadows of death, let us cry out to Him: "Come!" And He will come with His grace to purify us and lift us up. If we sit in sadness and dejection, let us continue pleading: "Come! Come!" And He will come with His presence to scatter our sadness and with His help to strengthen our weakness. May the constant cry of hope and of desire never fail to rise from our heart; then each coming of Jesus will purify us, give us life, and make us happy by inflaming us with love. – *Archbishop Martinez*

THE GREAT PROMISE TO ST. GERTRUDE

To him who ever thought with love of me
Or ever did for my sake some good deed
I will appear, looking such charity
And kind compassion, at his life's last need
That he will out of hand and heartily
repent he sinned and all his sins be freed.

- Gerard Manley Hopkins

Sister Mary Jeremy noted that Hopkins's poem is based on a passage in the Revelation of St. Gertrude:

Having heard a preacher declare that no person could be saved without the love of God, and that all must at least have so much of it as would lead them to repent and to abstain from sin, the saint began to think that many, when dying, seemed to repent more from the fear of hell than from the love of God. Our Lord replied: "When I behold anyone in his agony who has thought of Me with pleasure, or who has performed any works deserving of reward, I appear to him at the moment of death with a countenance so full of love and mercy, that he repents from his inmost heart for having ever offended Me, and he is saved by this repentance."

That few readers of this poem have recognized it as a close paraphrase of St. Gertrude's lines is one of many evidences that her influence, though strong, has been, as was her cloistered life, hidden.
