MATERNAL TENDERNESS

If we are prepared to allow God to speak to us of His transcendence, we then understand His infinite impatience to give us all things as quickly as possible, so as to bring us to total happiness without delay. We shall begin to suspect that He is not to blame for the delay we suffer, in the same way that He cannot be blamed for hell. When there is no answer to our most praiseworthy prayers, we may be sure that it is not God's fault but our own. Perhaps because our hope is so feeble, we resign ourselves to delay too easily, and we insult God by imagining that He does not love us, at least with that extraordinary love whose transcendence we fail to recognize.

Our lack of desire, our want of intelligence, even perhaps our laziness-all these we are pleased to call "patience," because we object to being upset by too violent a love, too swift a response. Alternately—and sometimes concurrently—we are horribly impatient, demanding instant response, not because we are hard pressed by charity but because we want to make an end to this painful state of desire, to the torments that love of God imposes. The fault is all on our side. Where we are patient or impatient, it amounts to the same thing. We are trying to protect ourselves from the fire that Jesus Christ came to cast upon the earth.

Our most fervent prayers oscillate between laziness and revolt, between hot and cold, without finding the right tone, the infinitely soft and powerful note that brought down the walls of Jericho with a single blast. God waits in infinite desire to hear this note from us. He cares for us with a maternal tenderness, the visible expression of which He has placed in the hands of the Blessed Virgin, that little by little, through the clumsy repetition of our stumbling prayers, we might learn the incredible whisperings of the Holy Spirit. – Fr. M.D. Moliné, O.P.





THE ROSARY

In its present form, the rosary was made known to the world by St. Dominic at the time of the struggles with the Albigensians, that social way of such ill-omen for the Church. The rosary was then of more avail than armed forces against the power of Satan; it is now the Church's last resource. It would seem that the ancient forms of social prayer being no longer relished by the people, the Holy Spirit has willed by this easy and ready summary of the liturgy to maintain, in the isolated devotion of these unhappy times, the essential of that life of prayer, faith, and Christian virtue, which the public celebration of the Divine Office formerly kept up among the nations. Before the thirteenth century, popular piety was already familiar with what was called the psalter of the laity, that is, the angelical salutation repeated one hundred and fifty times; it was the distribution of these Hail Marys into decades, each devoted to the consideration of a particular mystery, that constituted the rosary. Such was the divine expedient, simple as the Eternal Wisdom that conceived it, and far-reaching in its effects; for while it led wandering man to the Queen of Mercy, it obviated ignorance which is the food of heresy, and taught him to find once more 'the paths consecrated by the Blood of the Man-God, and by the tears of His Mother.'

"CATCH OF THE DAY"

Dear Readers,

I would like to share with you a fishing story worthy of St. Peter himself. Among the chapels of which I have pastoral care is Our Lady of the Snows, in northern Lower Michigan. This part of Michigan presents many opportunities for outdoor recreation, particularly fishing. One of our parishioners, Mr. Joe Warsecke, occasionally likes to wet a hook, but his neighbor, Doug Miller, is a truly avid fisherman. In late winter, Mr. Miller enjoys pursuing steelhead in the Sturgeon River, about fifteen miles north of Our Lady of the Snows Chapel. Now bear in mind that Mr. Miller does not attend Our Lady of the Snows, and that he and Mr.

Warsecke live about thirty miles north of the Chapel. In February, our neighbors were chatting, and Mr. Warsecke asked Mr. Miller if he would try to catch a steelhead for him. That gave Mr. Miller a perfect excuse to take advantage of a fine sunny day. He headed to a pool on that Sturgeon River, near the community of Wolverine, Michigan. As he began to cast his line from the snow-covered bank, he noticed something shiny in the shallow water near the pool. It looked like a fishing box. Mr. Miller moved closer, and managed to snag the box with his hook. He then worked it closer to shore, and got it in his hand net. Upon opening the box, he discovered that it contained, not tackle or bait, but, as he described it, "a gold cup and a little gold plate." Something seemed a little "fishy" about this catch, so he contacted the local police, who then turned the box and contents over to a detective at the local Michigan State Police post.

Mr. Miller returned home, and a few days later, his neighbor dropped by to inquire about his success with the steelhead. Sorry, no steelhead yet, but he described what he had "caught." Mr. Warsecke promptly called me with a message to call him back. When I returned the call, he asked me, "Father, are you sitting down?" then relayed what he had heard. We discussed the matter briefly, then I called the detective Trooper Taplan at the Cheboygan, Michigan State Police post. I described for him, with as much detail as I could, the chalice and paten (and the box in which they were kept) that had disappeared from Our Lady of the Snows Chapel shortly before Christmas. Based on my description, he assured me that it was indeed our chalice! I also provided him with the case number for the report made at the Sheriff's Office in Gaylord, back in December. We then made arrangements for the return of the chalice, with paten and case, once he had completed his report.

Our chalice came back to Our Lady of the Snows on Laetare Sunday, March 22, 2009. This is a simple chalice, yet it is sacred because of its consecration and intimate connection to the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. It also dates back to Our Lady of the Way

Mission, before we had the church building. Hence, it has a special connection to the preservation of the Faith in Northern Michigan. We will now treasure and guard it—all the more—because of its marvelous return. Indeed, it will be used with special gratitude during the sacred ceremonies of Holy Week.

Are there any spiritual lessons to be drawn here? Most certainly! The first is that of God's loving Providence, and our consequent debt of gratitude. The second is the need to persevere in the integrity of the Faith, despite the discouragements that we must face. The third is that we need to pray for the light both to desire, and to pray for, the right things. The fourth is an admonition to go after the "big fish"—the conversion of the one who stole the chalice.



FROM ST. ROBERT BELLARMINE

Here St. Robert Bellarmine inspires readers with a reflection on verse one of Psalm 91, "he who dwells in the shelter of the Most High:"

Notice that what is said is not "he who trusts"...but "he who dwells." This is to convince us that we are not to fly to the divine protection as men do to a tree or a doorway when it rains, but rather as little boys who rush to their father's arms when anything frightens



But people who seek refuge from rain under a tree have a good look around first. It is only when no better shelter is available that they run willy-nilly to the tree. Why is it that some men implore divine assistance without receiving it, and seem to put their trust in God without being protected by Him? The reason is that they do not really dwell in the aid of the Most High, nor take shelter under the providence of God as in their Father's house. They rather make sporadic dashes to it in time of trouble, as they do to a tree when there is a sudden shower. It is therefore very necessary for us to get into the way of always and instinctively turning to God.
