MASS OF QUINQUAGESIMA SUNDAY

As a prelude to Lent, Jesus announces, "We go up to Jerusalem," city of the Great Sacrifice. Yet, despite all His teaching that suffering is necessary as expiation for sin, His followers were blind, they "understood not." (Gospel.) Hence, He proceeds to strengthen their weakening faith by giving sight to a blind man because of his strong faith. If faith is necessary to understand the meaning of Lenten penance, how much more necessary is charity: charity for God, charity for neighbor (Epistle). "For where there is love, there is no labor." The Introit, Collect and Gradual inspire confidence in God as we are about to "go up" with Him. The Offertory expresses gratitude for faith and pleads for its increase. The Communion reflects on the charity of God as our model.

★ THE BISHOP'S NOTE **★**

It is Wednesday as I write this note in the beautiful town of Annecy, France, which is nestled in the French Alps and was the home of the holy Doctor of the Church, St. Francis de Sales, to whom we are dedicating this Lenten season. Annecy is the place where the bishops of Geneva, only a 30-minute drive from here, had to reside during the persecution of the Catholics by the Calvinists. St. Francis here gained the support of the local rulers to be able to once more move the Episcopal See back to Geneva. That is quite an interesting story! Just across the street from my little flat is the church in which the great saint was ordained; a few blocks away is the church in which his mother prayed to have a child who would be consecrated to God in the religious life; it is here that St. Francis and St. Jane Frances de Chantal began the foundation of the Visitation Order; and one of the most edifying things that I found out is that the house in which he stayed while he wrote his deeply profound Treatise on the Love of God is just up the street. The relics of St. Francis and St. Jane are both kept in the church of the Visitation overlooking the city.

As Catholic a history as this place has, it is a far distant history. Annecy, as the rest of Europe, has become a shameless place. Europe, too, is very much divided because of the question of the Una Cum Mass of the SSPX. As we know, it is mortally sinful to attend a Mass in which any of the heretics of Vatican II are named. The theology is simple. Only a Catholic pope can be mentioned in the Canon of the Mass. If any other than a Catholic pope is mentioned, then the Mass is being offered in union with (una cum) someone outside the Church and is equivalent to an act of schism. This is no matter of opinion. However, there are other matters of lesser weight which cause a deep division among the Catholics in Europe. But on to better things...

The Confirmations in Rennes and Chambèry went very well. I think we had thirty or so in Rennes and eighteen in Chambèry. That chapel in Rennes is run by **Fr. Roger**, who was ordained by Bishop Dolan in the late 1990s, and **Fr. Hecquard** is an assistant there. Chambèry is served by Fr. Roger, **Fr. Thomas Le Gal** (a classmate of mine in the seminary) and some others, I believe. I had a nice opportunity to see many of our priests from the Companions of Jesus and Mary again (some of them were in Mexico for the diaconate).

While it was a joy to make new soldiers of

Christ, still it was a time of mourning for France and for the whole Catholic world over the recent death of the good Fr. Guèpin in Nantes. I was not able to make



the funeral Mass, unfortunately, but was able to go to pray for him in his chapel as his body was laid out for visitors. **Fr. Henry de la Chanonie** gave a warm welcome to me, Fr. Roger and Fr. Hecquard. It was nice to see him again, this time as a priest of God.

The Fathers here at St. Gertrude's are taking care of things while I am away. I am very thankful to them for their hard work. It was a time of much celebration, I think. February 8th was Fr. McKenna's birthday and his priestly anniversary was on the 11th—and it was his 11th anniversary, not his 12th! For those of you who might have wished him a happy 12th anniversary, I guess you don't have to send him good wishes next year since you have already done so!

It's time to roll up our sleeves and get down to some serious work in our spiritual lives as Lent begins with the blessing of Ashes this Wednesday. But please don't forget the feast of the Holy Face on Tuesday, a feast which is so dear to us here at SGG. Come to the High Mass on Tuesday to ask Our Lord's blessing and St. Francis de Sales' intercession for a holy Lent!

ASH WEDNESDAY

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V V **Why** penance and reparation? Because, in Christ's words, "Unless you do penance, you shall **all** likewise perish".

Is it any wonder that on Pentecost Sunday, after Peter preached his sermon, and rebuked the people for their sins, and they asked him, "what must we do," his first word to the multitude was the imperative verb, "Repent!"

Is it any wonder that Our Lady of Fatima's message to a sinful world in our day, may be summarized in the same imperative, "Do penance."

Indeed, the calamities that we have seen in the last century: two world wars with more casualties than in all the previous wars of history, and the threat of a nuclear holocaust that hangs over us like a tornado cloud. All of this is God's warning to do penance and reparation. Why? Because God is not mocked.

You do not offend God with impunity. You do not sin without retribution. You do not ignore the will of the Almighty and expect the Almighty to ignore what you do.

What bears emphasis, however, is that this retribution is either to be paid willingly, with our penance and reparation, or will be paid unwillingly within the divine punishment.

The divine logic is simple, awfully simple, and all we have to do is learn what God is telling us. Either we do penance and reparation because we want to, or we shall suffer (against our will) the consequences of our sins in this life, and in the life to come.

But remember, this penance and reparation is to be done not only for what we have personally done wrong. It is for all the pride and lust, for all the cruelty and greed, for all the envy and laziness and gluttony of a sin-laden human family. God is merciful, all merciful, The Sacred Heart is an Ocean of Mercy. But despite what the Novus Ordo tells you, God's mercy is conditional. It is conditional on our practice of penance and reparation.

Suppose we spend a moment each day on one of these seven rules, and ask Our Lord, to open our hearts to respond with generosity to His offended Sacred Heart.

THURSDAY AFTER ASH WEDNESDAY: LENTEN CONFESSION

Simon the leper called Magdalen a sinner, but our Savior spoke not of her sins, but only of the precious ointment which she poured out, and of the fullness of her love. If we are truly humble, we shall grieve bitterly over sin because it offends God, but we shall find sweetness in accusing ourselves, because in so doing we honor Him; and we shall find relief in fully revealing our complaints to our physician. When you are before your spiritual father, suppose yourself to be on Mount Calvary, at the Feet of the Crucified Jesus, Whose Precious Blood drops upon you to purify your iniquities.... Hesitate not then to open your heart fully in confession, for in proportion as your sins go forth, the precious merits of Christ's Passion will come in and fill you with all blessings.

FRIDAY AFTER ASH WEDNESDAY THE CROWN OF THORNS

For if indeed, as the Angelical Doctor tells us, the sure way of attaining to the love of God is to dwell upon His mercies, the more we appreciate them, the more we shall love Him.... Assuredly nothing can so humble us before the compassion of God as the abundance of His mercies; nothing so humble us before His justice as the abun-

dance of our misdeeds. Let us reflect upon all He has done for us, and all we have done against Him; and as we count over our sins in detail, even so let us count over His mercies.

We need not fear to be puffed up with the knowledge of what He has done for us, if we keep well before us the truth that whatever good there may be in us, it is not of us. Though a mule is laden with the precious and perfumed treasures of a prince, is it not still a clumsy, filthy beast? "What has thou that thou didst not receive? And if thou didst receive it, why dost thou glory, as if thou hast not received it?" (1 Cor. iv, 7.)

Prayer for Humility

O God, Who resisteth the proud and bestowest Thy grace on the humble, grant us the virtue of true humility of which Thine only-begotten Son showed to the faithful an example in Himself; that we may never provoke Thee to anger by our pride, but rather receive through humility the gifts of Thy grace. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

SATURDAY AFTER ASH WEDNESDAY

If in the consideration of God's grace any vanity were to slip in, we should find an infallible remedy in the remembrance of our ingratitude, our imperfections, our weakness; and if we reflect on what we have done without God, we shall require no further proof that what we do when He is with us is not of ourselves or of our own strength; we shall rejoice in it certainly, and rejoice because we have done it, but we shall give all the glory of it to God, Who is its author.

Thus the Blessed Virgin declared what great things God had done in her, but only in order to humble herself and exalt Him. "My soul," she says, "doth magnify the Lord.... Because He that is mighty hath done great things to me" (St. Luke i, 46-49).

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V A Act of Consecration by St. Francis de Sales Most Holy Mary, virgin Mother of God, I (full name), most unworthy though I am to be thy servant, yet touched by thy motherly care for me and longing to serve thee, do, in the presence of my guardian angel and all the court of heaven, choose thee this day to be my queen, my advocate, and my mother, and I firmly purpose to serve thee evermore myself and to do what I can that all may render faithful service to thee.

Therefore, most devoted Mother, through the precious Blood thy Son poured out for me, I beg thee and beseech thee, deign to take me among thy clients and receive me as thy servant forever.

Aid me in my every action, and beg for me the grace never, by word or deed or thought, to be displeasing in thy sight and that of thy most holy Son.

Think of me, dearest Mother, and desert me not at the hour of death. Amen.

FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

These grievous assaults and powerful temptations are never permitted by God save to those whom He purposes to exalt in His pure and excellent love. Nevertheless they are not on this account certain to attain thereto, for sometimes those who have bravely withstood such violent attacks, do not continue faithful to the divine goodness, but are overcome by little temptations. Therefore should you ever be afflicted by grievous temptations, be sure that God grants you a special favor by which He intimates that He would raise you up before His Face; but still be very humble and fearful, not feeling confident that you can overcome trifling temptations because you have overcome greater, except by continual faithfulness to Him. "Save me, O God: for the waters are come in even unto my soul. I stick fast in the deep mire, and there is no sure standing; I am come into the depth of the sea, and the tempest hath overwhelmed me."

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FAST & ABSTINENCE

RULES OF FAST: The laws of fast apply to persons between the ages of 21 and 59. On a fast day one may eat one full meal and two light meatless meals, which together would not equal the main meal. Meat may be taken at the principal meal, except on days of complete abstinence. Liquids such as water, milk, and fruit juices may be taken between meals.

RULES OF ABSTINENCE: The laws of abstinence apply to everyone seven years of age and over. On a day of complete abstinence no meat, meat gravy or soup made from meat may be taken. On a day of partial abstinence meat may be taken once.

TRADITIONAL DAYS OF FAST: All the weekdays of Lent (Monday through Saturday) up until noon on Holy Saturday; Ember Days; the Vigils of Pentecost, the Immaculate Conception, and Christmas.

TRADITIONAL DAYS OF COMPLETE AB-STINENCE: Every Friday of the year; Ash Wednesday; Holy Saturday (until noon); the Vigils of the Immaculate Conception and Christmas.

TRADITIONAL DAYS OF PARTIAL AB-STINENCE: Ember Wednesdays and Saturdays, and the Vigil of Pentecost.
