

▼ THE POETRY CORNER

ST. FRANCIS XAVIER AND OUR LADY



St. Francis Xavier, who like the apostles was called to preach the faith in far countries, was sustained in all his labors by the protection of the

Blessed Virgin, whose devout client and servant he was. He had such vivid faith in her intercession that he had recourse to her for every grace. In the Church of Our Lady at Montmartre in Paris (1534) he consecrated himself to the apostolic life on the feast of her Assumption, and in her church at Loreto he received the interior call to go to India. To publicly acknowledge himself a servant of Mary, he wore her Rosary on his breast.

When the Saint explained the doctrines of our holy religion to the Oriental people among whom he labored, he was wont to close with the Salve Regina, entreating the Mother of grace to preserve the Faith to these people. Often he spent the whole night in a church in prayer, usually before a picture of the Blessed Virgin. To her he went for help in his own affairs and in those of his spiritual children, imploring her intercession with a childlike trust. He had a particular veneration for the mystery of the Immaculate Conception and made a vow to defend it with all his power. Dying, he fervently called upon Mary and gave up his saintly spirit into her hands and those of her divine Son.

ON THE ASSUMPTION

What, then, had taken place? Someforeshadthing owed ages before by the carrying up of the Ark to Jerusalem, with all the pomp and circumstance of David's solemn procession. In a very real sense Mary was the Ark of God. The Ark of old was formed of incorruptible

wood; the Mother, whose pure bosom had been the dwelling place of God's only begotten Son, was always free



from the taint of corruption wrought by Adam's transgression. The material Ark was overlaid both within and without with pure gold; Mary's interior life was resplendent with every virtue. Of her the psalmist sings: "The glory of the King's daughter is within golden borders, clothed round about with varieties" (Ps 44:14-15). Her life in the eyes of men, moreover, was a perfect example of holiness; she was "the Queen...in gilded clothing" (Ps 44:10).

That twenty-third psalm, applied by the Church to Christ's glorious Ascension, may be fittingly adapted, as we have said, to Mary's entry into the courts of heaven. For she had been in closest union with her Son on earth, conformed with Him also in His triumph after death. God would not suffer His "Holy One to see corruption" in the tomb. After three days, He would raise her to immortal life, and His angels would bear her to realms of bliss.

How far more magnificent that progress than the transfer of the material Ark of old! In place of David, King of the earthly Jerusalem, the "Prince of the kings of the earth" (Apoc 1:5) is foremost in welcoming her to the tabernacle prepared for her. No guard of honor composed of mere earthly warriors, however noble and distinguished, is worthy to escort her: hosts of radiant angels fill the expanse of heaven to do her honor. In place of the feeble strains of earthly melodies from human lips, the canticles of heaven resound, poured forth by angelic voices. Instead of harp and psaltery and golden cymbal, are heard celestial harmonies of ravishing sweetness.
