As Christmas Nears

Commercially Christmas has become only a gimmick for making money rather than a feast celebrating the birth of Christ. Medieval winter scenes appear in advertisements before the symbol of the Christmas star, and the so-called Santa Clauses precede the Crib-picture. It is up to Christians today to show the world the real Christ of Christmas, to restore the child-wonder of breathless beauty brought back to life by the liturgical celebration.

The Christmas Wreath

A much-loved custom is the use of the Christmas wreath. It too may be a family project fashioned by loving hands and made of any green available at Christmas time.

The wreath is usually decorated with a large bow or with tiny bells or cones, and hung in the window. Some like to place it outside the front door as a welcome token. By its circular pattern it shows the love of God, which has neither beginning nor end, and indicates our belief that it was this universal love which brought Christ down into the world, a tiny Babe in a cold manger at Bethlehem.

The Christmas Candle

As the great day approaches, holy anticipation sharpens our faith and sanctifies our hope and joy, while we prepare the Christmas candle. Any ordinary candle may be used, even one which has been decorated by the children, though nowadays commercial candles, very beautiful ones, are easily come by. A simple white blessed candle would be appropriate, since it typifies Christ, the Light of the world.

Preferably it is placed in the window on Christmas Eve, and as night falls, it shines forth to tell all the world that Joseph and Mary are welcome in the home. Perhaps it would be lighted by the father of the house, while all kneel and mother or one of the children reads aloud the Christmas story from the second chapter of St. Luke. This is one ceremony the children will always remember.

★ THE BISHOP'S NOTE **★**

The third Sunday of Advent—a day dedicated to joy, as it were. Holy Mother Church wants us to rejoice because the day of salvation is very near. Who is not filled with hope and joy at the thought of the Infant Savior's birth in Bethlehem!? Keep your thoughts on the humble manger and remain close by Our Lady and St. Joseph making their journey to the town where Mary will give birth to Our Lord and the reality of our Redemption begins.

The snow came on Friday, but not nearly as much as the weather man predicted. This is often the case, isn't it? Still, the snow-covered trees were a beautiful sight to behold. The bright red cardinals add a touch of beauty that only God could make. The cats aren't too fond of the snow, I've noticed, since they hide themselves indoors for the most part. But every season has its beauty—even the days when the skies are covered with gray. On those days we must remember the truth that the sun is still shining brightly above the clouds. We do not see it but it is there. Similarly, we must live by the Faith. Even though we do not see God or His saints or any of the countless hosts of angels, we know that they are up there in heaven rejoicing for eternity. The public prayers of the Church consist not only of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass but also of the Divine Office, the prayers of the priests' Breviary. The Office was at one time chanted by some religious Orders. Certain parishes are reviving the custom of having Solemn Vespers on the eve or afternoon of major feasts. The Magnificat or Canticle of the Blessed Virgin Mary is chanted near the end of Vespers. Starting on December 17 a series of Antiphons are added to Vespers before and after the Magnificat. Just to read those "O Antiphons" each day would be a wonderful part of any Catholic's preparation for Christmas!

"The following Antiphons are said entire before and after the Magnificat, from the 17th to the 23rd of December, inclusive. If the Vespers are of a first or second class double, the great Antiphon is said after the prayer of the feast, for the commemoration of Advent.

Antiphon for the 17th of December (O Sapientia): O Wisdom that comest out of the mouth of the Most High, that reachest from one end to another, and dost mightily and sweetly order all things: come to teach us the way of prudence!

Antiphon for the 18th of December (O Adonai): O Adonai, and Ruler of the house of Israel, who didst appear unto Moses in the burning bush, and gavest him the law in Sinai: come to redeem us with an outstretched arm!



Antiphon for the 19th of December (O Radix): O root of Jesse, which standest for an ensign of the people, at whom the kings shall shut their mouths, whom the Gentiles shall seek: come to deliver us, make no tarrying.

Antiphon for the 20th of December (O Clavis): O Key of David, and Sceptre of the house of Israel; that openest and no man shutteth; and shuttest and no man openeth: come

to bring out the prisoner from the prison, and them that sit in darkness, and in the shadow of death.



Antiphon for the 21st of December (O Oriens): O Dayspring, Brightness of the everlasting light, Sun of Justice, come to give light to them that sit in darkness and in the shadow of death!

Antiphon for the 22nd of December (O Rex): O King of the Gentiles, yea, and desire thereof; O Corner-stone, that makest of two one: come to save man, whom Thou hast made of the dust of the earth!





Antiphon for the 23rd of December (O Emmanuel): O Emmanuel, our King and our Lawgiver, Longing of the Gentiles; yea, and salvation thereof: come and save us, O Lord our God!

Your OCEN SGO donation can be claimed when you file your Ohio taxes. Gifts made through April 15th can be retroactively applied to the previous year's taxes. The credit is a dollar-to-dollar reduction in your state tax liability up to \$750 per taxpayer. A married couple filing jointly can claim a credit of up to \$1,500. To receive the full tax credit, you must have an Ohio tax liability equal to or greater than the amount of the credit.

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
