FAITH'S PROMISES & DEMANDS


Faith...is a giant cannon which hurls man out beyond the boundaries of the universe into the world of the infinite. It is not to be conceived of as something mild, sweetly enfeebling. Rather it must be thought of in terms of strength, of an explosion which has broken down the walls of the world, of a storming of nature by the hosts of heaven that man might be released from the limitations of his humanity. It grants to man the freedom by which he can surpass not only the limits of the present, of the past, of space, of material things, but even the limits of all nature. By it his mind walks into the limitlessness of God.

In the face of faith we feel an irritation at its darkness, its obscurity. Of course faith is obscure. The whole point of faith is precisely that it gives us a truth we cannot see of ourselves. Because we are using the eyes of God, in the darkness we can know the incredible truths that only God can see....

The obscurity of faith gives us a promise that here and now in this darkness we will hear of unutterable things, things that only God has a right to see. More than that, it is a promise that when this present darkness cowers and flies before an eternal sun, these incredible truths will remain for us to see with our own eyes. Indeed this obscurity is a beginning of a future life, the beginning of that vision of God which will reach its full clarity only when life is over and we have attained our goal. The authority to which we must submit is not an insult, it is a guarantee, a guarantee that trusting ourselves to God in this darkness, nothing of injury shall come to us. We shall not be misled, not be tricked; but rather we shall be shown the riches, the beauty, the goodness of divinity.



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Last weekend's snowstorm turned out to be the real deal; the type of storm that I haven't seen since my childhood days—although we did get one last year for the Epiphany, too! Some say we got as many as 16" of snow. It was enough to keep pretty much everyone off the roads. On that Sunday, we only had 40 to 50 souls come to Mass and we even had to cancel the 11:30. **Fr. Lehtoranta** commented that he has not seen a Sunday like that since he has been working here. Nor have I! The Sisters got both of their cars stuck and **Fr. McKenna** and **Fr. Brueggemann** had to go shovel them out and bring at least one of the cars back to church. Somehow they managed to crash into each other in the process, not doing any damage to the cars! The angels witnessing these scenes must have been amused. I am just happy that the angels saw to it that no one was hurt!

While you were suffering through a blizzard here in Ohio I was enjoying 80 degrees and sunny weather down in Florida. It was nice to see **Bishop Sanborn**, who offered a Solemn Pontifical Mass on the celebration of the 50th wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Selway. I used the opportunity to visit with many of the people whom I taught in the Queen of All Saints Academy in my last year as a seminarian and my first year as a priest. I knew these people when they were just teenagers and now most of them are either religious or have gotten married. It was so good to see them and to get reacquainted. It was also a stark reminder of how fast time goes by. The trip also took me a little farther south to visit with Fr. McKenna's parents whom I have not seen for a while. When all was over I had been thinking about all the snow in Ohio and how I had parked my car on the top level of the parking garage and that now it had to be cleaned off upon my arrival at the airport. But God provided! A big thank you to Fr. McKenna and **Fr. Simpson** for going all the way to the airport to clean off my car. It was very thoughtful of them!

The old home place back in Chillicothe has finally sold. It is bittersweet. On the one hand, it is nice to have one less property to have to manage. On the other hand, it is the closing of a chapter of life which is rich in many good memories. There are the family memories, of course, but that little house was also the last site of the old St. Clare Mission. In that house had been offered many a Holy Mass, and many souls were absolved of their sins, and Confirmations administered. Many priests visited there and Faithful came from as far away

as Columbus to attend Mass. The Blessed Sacrament was reserved there as well. Well, it is now the closing of this chapter. However, it is best (at least in my opinion) to not spend too much time dwelling on the past, but to look forward so as not to miss the next opportunity of doing good.

### ST. BLAISE, FEBRUARY 3 – BLESSING OF THROATS



The third of this month is the Feast of St. Blaise, Patron of Throats. St. Blaise, was Bishop of Sebaste in Armenia, who died as a martyr in 316. His remains were transferred to Paris where a church was erected in his honor. He is considered to be one of the wonder workers. The faithful call upon him in diseases of the throat and teeth. According to some authors, while St. Blaise was in prison he kept a young boy who had a fish bone lodged in his throat from choking to death. The blessing of St. Blaise is given with two candles formed in the cross of St. Andrew.

During the blessing of throats on this day, the Church prays over her children by the lips of the priests: "Through the intercession of St. Blaise, Bishop and Martyr, may God deliver thee from troubles of the throat, and from other evil, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

Blessing of throats will take place after each Mass.

### THE HUMILITY AND OBEDIENCE OF MARY

Mary, whose divine childbearing had only made her purer and more virginal, was certainly exempt from the precept relative to the ceremony of purification. Nevertheless, she subjected herself to it, and, keeping to the letter of the law, appeared at the temple forty days after the Savior's birth. The imitator of her Son, Who hid His divinity under the weakness of infancy, Mary wished to hide her august dignity of Mother of God, by comporting herself outwardly like ordinary women. Does the spirit of Jesus and Mary dwell in us?
