

* SUNDAY MEDITATIONS

Perhaps when you read or hear today's parable, you focus on the different kinds of soils, or the environments on which the seeds fall. Maybe you even wonder which one of these soils best fits you, and you hope that you are like the good soil that produces abundantly. But how about seeing yourself as the sower instead? Maybe it's worth considering how much God may want you to sow the seed of His word.

If there is one word that characterizes the sower in this parable, it is *generous*. This fellow spreads his seeds everywhere. He doesn't seem all that concerned about where the seed will fall. He simply casts it to and fro.

Isn't this a great image for how we should view spreading the Faith? Shouldn't we be generous, almost indiscriminate, in the way we share God's word and His promises? We really shouldn't worry about where the seeds fall or the "soil quality" of those with whom we share the word. Whether, in our judgment, the ground is weedy, thorny, or fertile shouldn't matter. After all, it is the Lord Who gives the growth, not us (*1 Corinthians 3:6-7*). All we have to worry about is sowing as generously as we can.

Think for a moment how many other seeds the world, the flesh, and the devil are sowing all around us. There's nothing stingy in their tactics. How much more, then, should we counter all these poisonous seeds with the seeds of the Gospel! The need is great, so don't be intimidated! And by all means, don't feel defeated or outnumbered! God has promised to be with you always as you spread His word.

So how are you going to sow today? What opportunities will you seize to spread the seeds of the Gospel? They're all around, after all. Keep your eyes open, as you ask Our Lord to help you see ways you can show others His love. Who knows? He may even give you brethren in Christ who are just as zealous as you to proclaim God's word, in season and out!

CANDLE-LIGHT


Day has its sun,

❖ THE BISHOP'S NOTE ❖

It's funny how much we have become dependent upon computers and the internet these days. Last week someone tried to fix the internet so that it didn't slow down or shut down whenever the priests taught their online classes for the seminarians. Well, the problems got worse and now we're reduced to using our phones as hotspots. Not having the internet really slows things down. And that's the point! It's a time killer and keeps us so occupied that we scarcely find time to think of the more important things. Besides, after reading today's Epistle on the long litany of St. Paul's adventures in the apostolate, not having the internet seems to be a very minute inconvenience.

Our Candlemas ceremonies had a few minor glitches this year, but were very good overall. We do try our best to be perfect in the worship of God, but we are human and will, as humans do, make clumsy mistakes. Our Lord understands us though and does see our goodwill. We never will worship God as perfectly as the angels, but God does not expect us to—anymore than He expects a little child to pray as a grown man. Still, with all of the human errors, Our Savior came down upon the altar, sacrificing Himself mystically—and this is the sacrifice that pleases our heavenly Father most perfectly, and which more than makes up for our human blunders.

Attendance at Candlemas was impressive and shows your devotion to Our Lady. **Fr. McKenna** said that all had a good time at the soup supper. I was really looking forward to it, but ended up having to leave during the Mass due to the cold/flu that's been getting everyone lately. As of Friday I still have not recovered my voice (it's been three days) and so **Fr. Lehtoranta** kindly volunteered to preach. The thoughtfulness of the priests and people here at St. Gertrude's always catches me off guard and is so encouraging and edifying!

Sister Eulalia said that the Christmas decorations came down fairly quickly—and that with only a few families helping. Thank you to all that helped. The monthly shrine in the side chapel is dedicated to the Holy Face. It does look really nice. It isn't too often that Mass is offered over there anymore, but make it a point to go over and make quiet prayers of reparation to Our Lord's Holy Face.

This Wednesday, the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, is Fr. McKenna's anniversary of ordination. It will be celebrated with a Solemn High Mass. I do hope you can come—if not to that Mass, at least to one of the other Masses—to pray for Father on his big day. If

you can't do that, maybe just say a Hail Mary for him. He's a good priest and has done much good for souls.

First Confessions & Testing: Saturday, April 18. (Baptismal certificate must be already presented, and registration form completed *before* the test. Contact the church office for the necessary form.)

Confirmands' Day of Recollection (for Children):

Thursday, May 21

Confirmations: Vigil of Pentecost, Saturday, May 23

First Communion: Corpus Christi Sunday, June 7

Parents, please note: the Baptismal certificates of children not baptized at St. Gertrude the Great **must be submitted to the church office by Saturday, March 28**. If your child is not enrolled in the school or in Sunday catechism, please let us know if you are planning on bringing him to be tested on April 18.

It is sometimes difficult to know if the children are ready, but if they know their basics, and are reverent at Mass, they probably are! Please speak with Bishop McGuire.

Please note the following:

Children and parents must be attending Mass (and the children Class) **every Sunday**, not once or twice a month as sports or Sunday activities permit, in order to receive the Sacraments.

No child will be tested without his Baptismal Certificate and form filled out.

Sponsors must be members of St. Gertrude the Great, or a church affiliated with us. Please ask if you have a question.
